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Special Standing Rules

(These rules are among those which prevail for Conventions of the Synod.)

- 1. The Chair shall see that the agenda is followed as closely as possible.
- 2. Delegates wishing to address the Convention, when recognized by the Chair, shall state their name, and the name and location of the congregation, or of the administrative unit that they represent.
- 3. No delegate may speak in debate for longer than two (2) minutes per speech. No delegate may speak more than twice on the same motion on the same day and may not speak the second time until all delegates desiring to speak the first time have had the opportunity. The Chair shall have discretion to make exceptions to this rule. When a Floor Committee is called on to answer a question or to give information, this rule shall not apply.
- 4. A delegate who speaks on an issue may not move to call the question at the close of his/her speech. Any other voting delegate may call the question at any time.
- 5. Most votes will be taken by electronic key pad ballot. The Chair shall have discretion, however, to call for a vote other than by electronic key pad ballot. Instead of only a voice vote on such motions before the Convention, the Chair shall ordinarily also call for the raising of the right hand.
- 6. If a substitute motion is offered and seconded, the presenter shall be offered two (2) minutes to provide the rationale for offering it, and a member of the Floor Committee shall be offered two (2) minutes to present rationale for not considering the proposed substitute, after which the Convention shall decide by majority vote without further debate whether or not to consider the substitute. If the decision is in the affirmative and the substitute motion is adopted, the original motion fails. If the substitute motion does not receive a favorable action either to consider or to adopt, the original motion is again considered. (This is an adaptation of the so-called "Behnken rule" for dealing with substitute motions, as observed by the Synod.)
- 7. The presenter of any Resolution from a Floor Committee shall move adoption of the Resolution. Because it is understood that there is support from other members of the Floor Committee, a second shall not be required.
- 8. The preface, preamble, rationale, and whereas sections shall be regarded as integral parts of Resolutions and therefore subject to the same consideration and adoption as the main motion.
- 9. Whenever possible, amendments to proposed Resolutions and substitute Resolutions shall be submitted to the District Office or Convention Office for publication in *Today's Business* prior to Convention consideration of the resolutions to which they pertain. When this is not possible, as in the course of a discussion, a written copy of proposed amendments shall be provided to the Secretary either before or immediately after being offered from the floor.
- 10. Whenever an amendment is offered from the floor that seeks to make editorial or other helpful suggestions to a pending resolution coming from a Floor Committee, the Chair of the Floor Committee shall have the option of accepting such an amendment. If it is accepted, then the amendment is made without further debate or formal vote of the assembly.
- 11. In order to promote an orderly and non-distracting convention atmosphere, the following guidance shall apply to the use, and area of use, of electronic equipment, including wired and wireless communication devices, including laptops, cell phones, pagers, PDAs, or other similar devices. In all cases where use is permitted, the sound-producing capabilities of such

devices shall not be used. Except as approved by convention staff, personal extension cords shall not be allowed on the convention floor.

- 12. At such time as "pro-con" discussion is occurring, the front microphone will be designated the "pro" microphone and the back microphone will be designated as the "con" microphone. Motions or questions may be made from any microphone.
- 13. No motion to reconsider or rescind shall be made or called up during the last day of the Convention.
- 14. Resolutions prepared by the Floor Committees, which are not acted upon by the Convention before adjournment, die.
- 15. Unless covered by these standing rules of the Convention, parliamentary procedure shall be governed by the most recent edition of Roberts *Rules of Order Newly Revised*. Above all, the rules of Christian love and behavior shall apply.

Parliamentary Procedure

A. <u>Purpose of Parliamentary Law and Procedure</u>

The purpose of parliamentary procedure is to carry out the aims of the assembly in an orderly and fair manner, to expedite business, and to ensure justice and fairness to all, both the majority and the minority.

B. Basic Steps of Parliamentary Procedure

The Chairman and members of the assembly should be acquainted with and observe nine basic, essential parliamentary steps to take care of Convention business in an orderly and fair manner. They are:

Members:

- 1. Address the Chair. "Mr. Chairman" (or Mr. President)
- 2. Await recognition by the Chair
- 3. Identify yourself thus: "I am a pastoral/lay delegate from _____ congregation, city."
- 4. Make the motion. "I move that..."
- 5. Second the motion. (Unless not required)

Chair:

- 6. States the motion. (Or rules it out of order)
- 7. Calls for discussion. (Unless motion is undebatable)
- 8. Take the vote. (Or "Puts the Question")
- 9. States the results.

"The 'yeses' have it and the motion is carried." Or, "the 'noes' have it and the motion is lost." The vote does not go into effect until the results are announced.

A PRIMER OF PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

A. PURPOSE OF PARLIAMENTARY LAW AND PROCEDURE

The purpose of parliamentary procedure is to carry out the aims of the assembly in an orderly and fair manner, to expedite business, to insure justice and fairness to all, both the majority and the minority.

It is not the purpose of parliamentary procedure to make the conduct of business in an assembly difficult, or to entangle an assembly in technicalities, or to provide a channel for individuals to flaunt their parliamentary knowledge. The purpose is to make business flow more smoothly and make it easier for everyone.

Above all, there should be a spirit of Christian love and trust.

B. PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE AT A GLANCE

The motions or points listed below, 1 through 9, are in order of precedence. In other words:

- A. When any of them is pending, you may not introduce one listed below it.
- B. You may introduce one that is listed above it.

District Reconcilers

The 1992 Synodical Convention with its Resolution 5-01B adopted a new process of conflict resolution, replacing the previous adjudication process with a new reconciliation process. The resolution allows each District to name four Reconcilers, who are asked to serve for a period of six years on both the District level and the Synodical level when named to special Dispute Resolution Panels or in other unique circumstances.

In order to fill these positions, Circuit Visitors in each District of the Synod were asked to submit names of pastors and laymen to their District Boards of Directors. The Board of Directors was given final selection process. Special intensive training was provided by the Synod.

District President's Report to the 63rd Convention of The South Dakota District, LCMS

President Scott C. Sailer

"God's Gospel: Salvation Power" Romans 1:16-17

¹⁶ For I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes, to the Jew first and also to the Greek. ¹⁷ For in it the righteousness of God is revealed from faith for faith, as it is written, "The righteous shall live by faith." (Romans 1:16-17).

It is an honor to bring you this report at the end of my third term as the President of the beloved South Dakota District. What a joy it is to serve the Lord with you in this good place!

In the past triennium, we have walked together under the theme from the 2021 convention: "Rooted in Christ, Abounding in Thanksgiving," a theme reflecting the strong and loving faithfulness of our Savior and our being rooted in Him. The theme verses for the 2021 convention were Colossians 2:6-7:

"Therefore, as you received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving"

Our being rooted in Christ Jesus brings to us His unswerving care for us. Such rootedness in Christ was also the hallmark of the generations who had come before us in our District, since its founding in 1906. Our being rooted and built up in Christ ought to result in our living thankful and productive lives, which exhibit a multitude of deeds of kindness and words of witness. I am blessed to report that I see an abundance of such fruits of salvation in you, my dear brothers and sisters in Christ, as I travel throughout our District. Now, I am blessed to report to you regarding some of those fruits of salvation in our life together as His Church, since the last District Convention in December 2021. As I do, you'll see the mighty salvation power God has at work among us through His Gospel!

Buffeted but Not Broken by Covid

May this be the final report on the nasty coronavirus pandemic of 2020-2021! The pandemic directly impacted the very earliest months of the 2021-2025 triennium, but it seems to have produced some lingering effects, too. That said, we are grateful to our wonderful God that, although we were buffeted by the virus, we were not broken. Pastors and church leaders and congregation members made decisions to the best of their ability, and they respected the decisions of other congregations as how to handle matters dealing with the pandemic. So, by God's grace and the Spirit's direction, the proclamation of God's Word continued, on-line or inperson. Moreover, the saints continued to give their offerings to the Lord, so that, in most cases, our ministries did not suffer financially. This includes the ministries we do while we walk together as a District. Thank you for exhibiting such faith and faithfulness!

But are there some troubling lingering effects? Consider worship attendance. Back in 2016, our average weekend worship attendance among our 107 congregations at the time was 83. At the end of 2020, our congregations, making many adjustments because of Covid, averaged 53 in inperson attendance (on-line attendance was not counted in the numbers reported to the Synod).

God blessed us with a bounce-back in attendance, after the pandemic, with our average attendance in 2022 being 70, but we haven't bounced back all the way to our pre-Covid numbers. I'm sure the reasons for this are many and various; we can't place blame only on the virus. The solution? We will need to commit ourselves to weekly attendance in the Divine Service. We will

need to seek the sheep who have wandered away, even as we let the light of the Gospel shine so as to attract the unchurched to the riches of God's grace. In these ways, it is possible for us to bounce back to pre-2020 levels.

Blessed by Adjustments to How the District Carries Out Its Ministry

Have you noticed some of the new approaches to how the District is serving our church workers, congregations, schools, and other ministries?

- We used to have "Services Areas"; we now have the Mission and Ministry Council.
- We used to have one Executive Assistant to the District President, an Executive Secretary; we now have an Assistant to the President and a part-time Education Executive.
- Mr. Randy Gayken served as our part-time Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF) Vice-President until the end of October 2023, after 5 ½ years of service in this position. After he retired, we were served for a time by an Interim VP for LCEF, Mr. Kai Larson, from the Minnesota South District. Very recently, that changed when LCEF hired a full-time Vice-President to be shared by our District and the North Dakota District.

I believe that the Holy Spirit is guiding the development of these approaches so that we can be more effective in our Kingdom work. Allow me to explain more about these new approaches to the ministry done by our District:

Mission and Ministry Council: This Council was launched by the passing of 2021 District Convention Resolution 2-04. The main task of the Council is to ensure that helpful resources are provided to our workers, congregations, and schools, to assist them in carrying out the Lord's work. The Mission and Ministry Council, very ably chaired by Krista Erickson and advised by Rev. Paul Winckler, has replaced the Service Area committee structure, at least for the past triennium. Its future will be decided by the upcoming District Convention.

Consider some of the fruit the Spirit has worked through the efforts of the Mission and Ministry Council: 1) P.A.S.S. It On workshops were held in 2023 and 2024, 2) District Men's Retreats were planned and carried out in 2023 and 2024, due to the discussions coming out of meetings of the Council.

Much more about the work of the Mission and Ministry Council can be found in other sections of this Convention Workbook. I think our delegates should pass Resolution 2-01 at this Convention, so that the Council can continue and expand on its excellent work.

District Executive Staff: For many years, our District had an Executive Secretary, who assisted the District President in such areas as overseeing our District's subsidized ministries and assisting our church workers, congregations, and schools in ministry areas such as education and stewardship. When Rev. Darren Olson, our most recent Executive Secretary, accepted a call to Sioux Falls Lutheran School in July of 2021, the District's Board of Directors realized there was a need to especially assist the Lutheran schools in the District with such things as identifying candidates for call lists. Upon Rev. Olson's departure for his new call, the Board identified Mr. Dave Geidel, a retired, rostered commissioned minister and former school principal, now living in rural Dimock, as a possible candidate to serve as an "interim," part-time Executive Secretary to work with our schools. Mr. Geidel agreed to serve in this position in May of 2022, for what eventually became a 3-year appointment. He went to work assisting our Lutheran day schools and pre-schools. Later in 2022, Mr. Geidel's position would come to be known as "Education Executive," because he is our District's specialist in working with schools.

The Board of Directors soon created a second Executive Staff position: Assistant to the President. This person would oversee the subsidized ministries of the District, such as the two Native American ministries and our deaf ministry. He would also serve as the right-hand man to

the District President in visiting and encouraging the pastors and other church workers. In addition, he would be the staff person overseeing the work of the brand-new Mission and Ministry Council.

Rev. Paul Winckler was called to this new position, and he was installed as Assistant to the President on November 20, 2022.

It has been a tremendous blessing to have two District Executive staff persons in place so that one of them can concentrate on the needs of our schools and educators, and the other can devote his time to the many other areas of ministry that require attention, resources, and encouragement. One of the resolutions before us in the upcoming Convention deals with amending our Bylaws to continue to grant the Board of Directors sufficient authority and latitude to appoint Executive Officers to assist the District President. I hope the resolution passes.

LCEF Vice-President: It is important for our District to have a Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF) Vice-President 1) to encourage congregations and individuals to invest in LCEF to provide a financial pool of funds for church and school building projects, 2) to help South Dakota District ministries apply for loans, and 3) to promote the ministry solution resources available through LCEF. We are still getting used to the blessed reality that our District is a member of the Synod's LCEF, after having had our own Church Extension Fund for many decades. We are grateful a new LCEF Vice-President has been hired to steer the LCEF ship in the Dakotas.

Partnerships in Gospel Ministry

The Book of Ecclesiastes posits: "And though a man might prevail against one who is alone, two will withstand him – a threefold cord is not quickly broken" (Eccl. 4:12). What does this mean? There is strength and safety – and even joy – when work is undertaken together. So it is in the Church. Sometimes, an individual congregation finds it very difficult to continue operating because of financial limitations brought about by population loss and other factors. The struggling congregation will then seek a ministry partner in a neighboring community in order to maintain their presence in their own community. The resulting parish, made up of two LCMS congregations, is able to continue to let their Gospel lights shine when they support a pastor together, by way of an official parish agreement. This is why we have so many dual parishes (24 of them), tri-point parishes (7 of them), and even one quad-parish. When you do the math, you will find that seventy-three of our 105 LCMS congregations in South Dakota are in such Word and Sacrament ministry partnerships. We are among the leaders in the Synod is the number of multicongregation parishes we have.

Our congregations partner in other ways, too. The congregations send in offerings for ministry in our District and beyond, in addition to what they are already doing in their own congregations. The fruit borne through such generosity is the ability to provide salaries for various kinds of mission work: overseas missionaries, campus ministers, the afore-mentioned Native American missionaries and a deaf ministry pastor. Not one of our congregations could do this alone! But 105 congregations working together can, and they are.

I want to make special mention of the newest ministry the Lord is carrying out and multiplying in South Dakota, thanks to our collective prayer and financial support: Lutheran Family Service (LFS). What a blessing their individual and family counselors have been to many of our church workers and lay people! What a blessed adoption resource they are to Christian couples! What a blessed resource LFS is as their experts make presentations on marriage, caring for caregivers, the danger of pornography, and much more!

Your ongoing financial support for LFS is crucial, as they maintain offices in Sioux Falls and Deadwood, and extend their reach into Rapid City by way of the Deadwood office, as well. The

LFS resolution we'll consider in this Convention will be critical in extending the ministry agreement currently in force between our District and Lutheran Family Service.

Thank you, thank you for your generous support of the many partnerships in the Gospel the Lord is carrying out in our District!

Before I leave this topic, there are a couple realities we will face as we head into the future:

- Many of our congregations are gradually getting smaller and are finding it increasingly more difficult to go it on their own.
- There are fewer pastors and other church workers available to serve our congregations, schools, and other ministries.

Therefore, the need for circuits, regions of the District, and congregations to do more cooperative ministry will increase. The need to raise up more church workers will be ever before us.

Unprecedented Actions

Late in 2023 and early in 2024, we took a very unusual action as a District; it was, in fact, unprecedented. Almost always, it is at the Synod and District Conventions of our church body, where official business is conducted. But what happens when a very important matter arises between conventions, and, what's more, that matter had involved resolutions adopted by previous conventions? This happened with not one, but two, issues that came up here in South Dakota after the 2021 District Convention:

- 1) Whether to end the requirement that congregations pay for subscriptions to the *Lutheran Witness* for all congregational households, per a 1976 District Convention resolution, and
- Whether to amend a resolution from the 2021 District Convention regarding which overseas missionaries our District would support via the Together in Mission (TIM) program.

Regarding the *Lutheran Witness* matter, the cost of a year's subscription to the *Witness* had nearly doubled from 2022 to 2024, thereby creating unexpected, much higher expenses for the congregations and the District.

Regarding the Together in Mission matter, three missionaries from South Dakota (Revs. Samuel Bobby, Jordon Andreasen, and Jonah Domenichelli) had accepted calls overseas after the 2021 District Convention, and the Board wanted to include them as recipients of our support, too. The "problem" was that the Convention resolution specified only Missionary Daniel Jastram and Missionary Cory Rajek as the recipients of our TIM support.

What could we do? The Board of Directors did some research and found that the Synod Constitution, in Article XII.2 and 6, and in Article XI.B.8, provided us with the rationale and permission for putting those matters to a vote of our congregations in between conventions. When all the voting was finished on December 31, 2023, 72% of the participating congregations had voted to end the policy of congregations paying for subscriptions to the *Lutheran Witness* for all their households. An even larger majority, 96%, voted to add the other three South Dakota pastors to the group of missionaries receiving our support.

Many thanks are due to our congregational leaders and pastors for getting their congregations involved in this novel, unprecedented vote. By the way, this Convention will ratify the congregational vote in order to get it into the permanent records of the District via the Convention minutes.

Not Ashamed of That Powerful Gospel

I have a confession to make: I was a little selfish in choosing the theme and theme verses for the Convention! Romans 1:16 is my confirmation verse, given to me by my pastor, Rev. Garland Wittmayer, on April 22, 1973: For I am not ashamed of the gospel; it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who has faith, to the Jew first and also to the Greek (RSV). I was a serious confirmation student who took his confirmation verse seriously. I've lived in the powerful and profound peace that comes through the knowledge of the Good News that I have a mighty and gracious Savior in Jesus Christ. I've lived with the knowledge that Christ uses the Gospel message, shared by me (the saint-sinner that I am), to bless the lives of others.

This is my last Convention as your District President. Thank you for electing me to serve you, the first time back in 2015, and a couple times thereafter. After 10 years in this position, I'll be retiring when the next President is installed this coming spring, a month or two after his election.

Before then, I look forward to the Convention. Think of it! We get to do His Kingdom work in this marvelous part of God's Kingdom called South Dakota, as members of the LCMS South Dakota District. Most of the time, this work is done in our congregations and schools. But in February, we get to do the work of the Lord together in Convention.

At the Convention, we'll get to worship together, study together, pray together, make decisions together, converse over coffee together, and hear reports together on what God is doing among us by His Word and Spirit and through you.

We'll carry out those Convention activities because of the Gospel, and only because of the Gospel -- the Good News of Jesus' saving work for dead-in-sin nobodies. Think of it! Christ made you and me alive, and He keeps us alive when He *words* His way into our lives. He uses words of forgiveness and salvation taught to you, preached to you, applied with water upon you, and attached to bread and wine for you. Oh, yes, our theme is so true: "God's Gospel: Salvation Power."

At the Convention, we'll consider what may lie ahead of us as God's people, even as we thank Him for what He has already done for us in the 119 year history of our beloved LCMS South Dakota District. We are hope-filled because the tomb is completely empty. Christ is risen! He lives, and He is with us. We are hopeful because God has been faithful. He keeps His promises.

I'll see you in February, my dear sisters and brothers in Christ!



- Met with several governing boards, spoke at one school dinner auction, provided a back-to-school in-service, hosted a School Administrators gathering, served as the NLSA SD District Commissioner consulting with schools seeking accreditation, and attended the annual National Accreditation Commissioners meetings in St. Louis, many emails and phone conversations
- Attended way too many meetings

Ministry to the Deaf, Sioux Falls, SD

What a joy it is to serve in South Dakota. Not that things are perfect here, but as I travel to other parts of our country, I still see signs of COVID most anywhere I look. The other thing I notice in talking with people (both from within the LCMS and out) is that the mindset is not the same as most of our people have.

That being said, we are not without our own challenges here at home. Our winters make visits and service much more unpredictable. The distance between our people makes gathering more difficult. We also have the same problems most other churches are having, such as children falling away to many other activities pulling them every way but to church. You have peer pressure challenging both young and old alike.

I guess you could say deaf ministry is much like your church. There are some differences, but all in all, we deal with God's gifts and share them with sinners. Our church hasn't changed much in the past four years. Though some have joined others have moved and some have died. A number of our people outside of Sioux Falls have relocated, so our visits have had to be modified. The one thing that has changed is the number of people we have contact with in Rapid City has gone down so I do not make that trip as often as I used to.

We still work with a good number of non-members, which has its ups and downs. Whether it is in the hospital, homes, in public or at the church, it is always a joy to share the love and promise of Christ. It would be nice to see them a little more regularly on Sunday morning, but we thank God for the opportunities He provides.

We have been looking for ways to be more visible here in Sioux Falls. We have looked at signage that might let others know where we are before they are right in front of our building. We have also looked in to activities we could do to let others know us better. If you have any ideas please send me a note. Main Street Living is still a huge benefit, especially for those living out of town. I will quite often hear comments about it and how happy they are that Lynda is interpreting it for them.

I would like to thank you, the South Dakota District of The Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod, for your support of deaf ministry over the years. Without you this ministry would not be possible. In closing I would like to as three things of you; 1 – would you continue to keep us in your prayers, that more deaf would be lead to faith in Jesus. 2 – if you know of any deaf, please let me know. 3 – if you have any ideas of how we might be more effective please share them with me.

Missionary-at-Large to the Native American People at Pine Ridge

Yesterday, at our adult bible study, we had a discussion on what brings faith. Is it scientific proof, miracles, or even popular opinion? Of course, the answer is No! It is ALWAYS the WORD, working to bring faith. As the book of Romans says, "The Gospel is the power of God for salvation!"

As I reflect on that moment, I am reminded of God's power. Here we sit in a newly remodeled building, teaching adult Bible study, waiting for children to come into our afterschool program. The tribe owns the building. The tribe has issued a ban on missions that are not Native run. This was a concession from the ban of all Christian churches that preceded it a couple of weeks earlier. Yet here we sit discussing faith and the power of God. A moment almost missed by me until I sat down to write this. Further, none of this happened three years ago!

After Covid the South Dakota District partnered with the Tribe to remodel the old, abandoned building that we had used for the ministry for many years. This remodel turned out great with the addition of a kitchen. This allows us, and the tribe, to have community events and funerals. After the initial construction costs, our lease consists of paying for the utilities. This allows both of our entities continued use of the building.

In the last three years we have added an after-school program and adult Bible study on the first and third weeks of the month to compliment our holding services on the second and fourth weeks of the month. We now get down to the reservation once a week for ministry in one form or another.

Jeff and Diane Falin continue to be a blessing as Jeff helps with the driving and Diane teaches the children for the after-school program and Sunday school. I would not know what to do without them! My wife, Sarah, has taken up the position of chief cook in the wake of the retirement of Larry and Doris Belitz. Titus and Elizabeth, our still-at-home children aid in many ways as well. Donna Utecht is still our Mother-in-the-faith and comes faithfully to help when she is not traveling to visit grandchildren and great grandchildren. By the way she will be 95 when you read this! Aaron and Bria Sutton have moved back and are now coming regularly to help as well. Aaron is our 25-year-old son and had his start in our ministry playing cowboys and Indians with the local boys and got stuck up in a tree a couple times by the more aggressive older boys.

In addition to our normal services, we hold several community BBQ's and events per year. We usually do a VBS, Christmas and Easter give-away and Reformation carnival. This year we held a health fair put on by some local pharmacy students. This, with the addition of the home visits, hospital visits, hospice work and local outreach keeps us very busy.

We have also been blessed with a new-to-us pulpit, altar, and lectern and some table and chairs from Trinity, Belle Fourche. We pray for the former members there to find new church homes, thank God for his season of ministry there, and pray for the community at large.

All of our work has not been without its challenges though. The months of August and September we had septic backup issues in the building. We had more instances of cleaning up septic messes than we had actual services. We hope this has been resolved now, with the tribe doing some repairs to the main line. Sadly, we have lost many long-time members as they are now with Jesus. Many others have moved away to live in Rapid City. We still have sporadic contact with them through home and hospital visits. In 2023 we lost two children to gun violence. One family came to our after-school program only and the second was very close to our church and a multi-generational family. I had previously buried his mother, now him and finally his great-

great grandfather. It was a time of intense ministry and of course a story of Christ's redemptive power all in its own.

We continue to thank you all for your support of this great ministry by the district and, as always, we covet your continued prayers!

Rosebud Lutheran/Lord's Warriors Lutheran District Report 2025

Here on the Rosebud Reservation we are not ashamed of the Gospel, it is the power of God for salvation. It is important to not be ashamed especially amid the clear contrast of the different religions. While in much of South Dakota those who don't attend church would pick Christianity if it came down to it, in Rosebud people might just as easily, or perhaps even more readily choose the traditional Native American religion. People here also might choose no organized religion, and instead live a lifestyle of addiction and everything that goes with it.

We are not ashamed to share Jesus Christ, and him crucified. We do this on Sunday at Rosebud Lutheran with a regular attendance around 30, and in Lord's Warriors Lutheran in Parmelee with a regular attendance anywhere from 12-40. We also have mid-week Bible school, a daily radio devotion, summer VBS in 3 communities, and make plenty of home visits, as we care for many more people. Along with Baptisms, Funerals, and a few weddings, we continue to share Christ





Crucified. 2025 marks 32 years of ministry here.

One of the areas of life where Christ crucified as the power of God which is also a regular part of the ministry here is the house blessings, to remove evil spirits. As the traditional religion keeps and uses spirits, people have troubles with them on a regular basis. To be able to pray in faith, Our Father... deliver us from the evil one, is a true blessing, and to be able to share and teach people the freedom of following Christ is a joy.

One of the greatest joys has been teaching some young men and women of Christ, and helping them to walk in His way, so they are not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ. One young woman, Tessa, (pictured as she wanted to dance at the front of church to share with some visitors), recently stated, "I read my Bible before I go to bed. "and "Christian music is better than Rap music" This came especially after a couple of church groups came

over the summer, and helped her to grow in her life in Christ. Her close relative, Terrance, is a regular help in church, helping me to lead the worship service, and attending not only in Rosebud, but also in Parmelee. Having them and their family brings great joy.

We have also have been having our Rosebud kids help with Bible school, and in particular we have one boy, Aiden, who loves puppets. He has his own puppets he brings to church, and then he loves to help when we do puppets for VBS. He also encourages his cousins to help, and it all makes sharing Christ quite fun.

It is also a joy to share the ministry with different groups who come to help, from Brookings, Pierre, Sioux Falls, our churches in our circuit and zone LWML. We know that we are in this together as the SD District LCMS. We continue the Puppet Place at the SD State Fair. We also appreciate all the prayers, the financial support, the cookies, the quilts, the portals of prayer, and so many other donations that people share and encourage both our church members, and my family as we share Christ here. Campus Ministry SDSU, Brookings, SD

Mount Calvary has effectively become the home church of many SDSU students. It is often the first congregation where young people are truly accepted as full-fledged adults, and they become integrated in the life of the church. They worship with us, learn with us, and serve with us.

So far in the fall semester of 2024, we have worshipped with at least 62 students, averaging 21 in worship each week and 15 in our campus Bible study. In addition, we gave CPH Pew Bibles to over 80 students this fall semester, including a reading plan and information on Lutheran Student Fellowship (LSF).

Every Sunday, we worship together, eat lunch together, and study God's Word together in the evening. The students have devotions every Tuesday and some event every week. Alumni who have stayed in Brookings or relocated back to Brookings help the students by hosting meals or events.

LSF has been hosting an annual spring conference on topics of interest, e.g. "Speaking Truth in Love" and "Handling Hurts with Hope."

Last year, Papua New Guinea began sending its best and brightest high school graduates to SDSU to study in the STEM fields (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics). Currently there are more than 50 students from Papua New Guinea at SDSU, and we minister to some of them. This spring, we were blessed to baptize and confirm one of them.

Thanks be to God for faithfully working in and through SDSU campus ministry for over 75 years. And thank you for your continued support of this ministry.

Concordia Lutheran Church and Student Center USD, Vermillion, SD

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

The campus ministry at Concordia Lutheran Church in Vermillion, SD, serving the University of South Dakota, probably looks a bit different than usual, and at the very least drastically different than when I first arrived three years ago. When I arrived in the 2021-22 school year, we were averaging around 4 students at services and about 2 at Bible Studies, which were held on campus at that time. In both 2022-23 and 23-24, our average attendance tripled to about 12 at services and grew at Bible Studies as well, starting in the spring semester of 2023, when moving our Bible Study to Concordia caused it to grow to about 10 students, which is about where we stayed in 2023-24. As of the time of this writing, through September 29, we are averaging 16 students at service and 12 at Bible Study. [Addendum: this has slowed a bit in recent weeks as of 11/14. We're back at our numbers from last year or thereabouts. However, the good news is that we continue to see these same faces and have an excellent base of students that are in attendance at Concordia regularly!] We also have good turn-outs at our periodical fundraisers (D-Days bake sale and Advent/Lenten suppers), community outreach opportunities (our Reformation Day outreach) and student gatherings like movie nights and potlucks. God be praised for His wonderful work of providing hearers of the Word on the campus of USD!

I could point to a lot of factors for this, but I think the largest is a core group of undergraduate students that we added at the beginning of the 2022-23 school year who have been instrumental in encouraging those around them to be in service and have even begun inviting their friends from non-Missouri backgrounds to services and Bible Studies. There was also at this time a group of graduate students who were doing the same, but most of them have moved on to their next stage of life, so the fact that our numbers have not only survived that loss, but have actually thrived in the aftermath of the inevitable consequences of campus life is a wonderful reality!

One of the biggest success stories that I have to mention is the sheer influx of students new to the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, often from other Lutheran denominations but occasionally from other Christian denominations entirely. In the 2023-24 school year, we received four into membership through confirmation from the student population. Already at the time of this writing, I am preparing two more to be received into membership, with others considering the possibility. College is a great time of independence, and at USD there is an astounding abundance of students using that independence to discover the true Salvation Power of God's Gospel!

With all of this wonderful success, I would still like to note one area of need: your help! Even with the sheer growth of our campus ministry over the past few years, a good portion of those students are from districts outside of South Dakota. Our contingency of South Dakota students is growing, but your assistance is still very much needed! Report on the Admission of Congregations into Membership in the Synod and on Revisions of Articles of Incorporation, Constitutions and By-Laws of Congregations

Pursuant to the regulations of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod which govern the admission of congregations into Synodical membership, as well as the revision and amendment of Articles of Incorporation, Constitutions and By-laws of congregations, the following report is made. Please refer to the 2023 Handbook of the Synod, pages 56.

The procedure for congregations applying for membership is as follows:

- 1. Submit Articles of Incorporation (Constitution) and By-laws to District President.
- 2. District President refers documents to the District Constitution Committee for review.
- 3. District Constitution Committee examines documents and informs congregation of any necessary changes that must be made.
- 4. When documents are in order, this fact is reported by the District Constitution Committee to the District President who presents the application for membership to the District Board of Directors.
- 5. The Board of Directors acts on the application at any regular meeting.
- 6. The President and Secretary of the congregation, as representatives of the newly-admitted congregation sign the Constitution of the Synod in a special worship service normally attended by the District President.
- 7. District President presents certificate of membership to the congregation.
- 8. Signatures preserved by District Secretary.

The procedure for review of Articles of Incorporation, Constitutions and By-Laws is:

- 1. Mandatory to submit any change in all documents to District President.
- District President refers to District Constitution Committee for review.
- 3. District Constitution Committee notifies District President when documents are in harmony with Holy Scripture, the Confessions and the teaching and practices of the Synod and laws of South Dakota.
- 4. District President presents documents to District Board of Directors for approval.
- 5. When approved by the Board of Directors the congregation is notified that it may function under the new documents as a member of the Synod.
- 6. The congregation files a restated Articles of Incorporation with the State of South Dakota.
- 7. These actions reported to the next convention of the District.

As you can see, the District Constitution Committee plays a major role in the review process of corporate documents of member congregations and of congregations applying for membership.

The committee has normally has two members. Rev. David Otten serves as Chairman, and Rev. Jordon Andreasen had served as the other committee member. Another member is being sought. Providing legal advice, particularly regarding the compliance of congregations' governing documents with the codified law for non-profit agencies in South Dakota, is the District's legal counsel. Mr. Matthew Naasz, a member of Peace, Rapid City, has served as legal counsel since 2020.

Circuit 1 (Aberdeen)

Reverend Kevin Moore. Circuit Visitor

In the last triennium, through "God's Gospel: Salvation Power" in Word and Sacrament, our Lord has blessed the people, pastors and congregations of Circuit 1 of the South Dakota District to walk together in the joy and bold confession of our Savior, Jesus. In a world lost in sin and captive to the devil, the Lord continues to be at work through His Word and Sacrament among us when and where it pleases Him. Such work in the circuit includes:

- I. Circuit Worship Services take place in recognition of the fullness of our unity in the Word and Sacraments of our Lord Jesus on Epiphany, the Vigil of Easter, and Reformation.
- II. Circuit Youth are gathering at St. Paul's in Aberdeen for Bible Study and various activities twice a month. The Circuit Pastors organize two one-day retreats for both Confirmation age and High School youth each year in the Winter and Spring.
- III. Circuit retreats and presentations take place as often as possible to encourage the growth of the Word of God in our midst.
- IV. Circuit congregations have worked to build-up the Rural Gospel Initiative (RGI), an LCMS registered service organization, to encourage and help support current and future projects and ministry within the Circuit.

In the name of Jesus. Amen.

As out-going visitor, I'd like to express my thanks and appreciation to the pastors and congregations of this vast circuit along with the families of these faithful church workers. It's been a joy working alongside you in this place where the mutual consolation of the brethren is a hallmark of Word and Sacrament ministry. We saw a number of challenges these past three years with pastoral calls and acts of nature. Here on the South Dakota prairie weather often dictates what can and cannot be done on a daily basis. As circuit visitor, I'm especially thankful for the work and insight Missionary Andrew Utecht has brought to our monthly Winkels and the wisdom he displays in dealing with the challenges he faces. He is an integral partner in the work God is doing among us in this circuit. In March of 2024, Pastor Hinckley accepted the call to serve God's people outside the circuit. The workload doubled overnight, but the power of prayer and the Holy Spirit has not been without its effects. I should like to mention in this report the fruitful Winkels I've been privileged to lead and from which I have greatly benefited. In addition to our regular exegetical and confessional studies, we've been able to give some time and energy to

a study of Bonhoeffer's "Life Together," and more recently a discussion of St. Basil's "On the Holy Spirit." These short studies have often without intention wed well with the entire Winkel. One fall we were able to collaborate with the Mitchell Circuit to provide a one day Winkel in which Dr. Brian Mosemann was our presenter. It provided a different format in which each circuit conducted its own business during the lunch hour. My thanks to Dr. Mosemann and Pastor Loeslie for making this dual circuit conference possible. Our congregations were also blessed by the addition of Vicar Tom Penrod who attended our Winkels and has been serving faithfully under the very capable tutelage of Pastor Otten in Gettysburg and points east. His willingness to learn and teach us have been much appreciated. His commitment toward a called and ordained ministry among us has served to invigorate and encourage us toward on-going faithfulness despite declining numbers both in terms of membership and financial support. God be praised for His people coming together in service to Him and each other. Although many throughout the district brand us "the Pierre Circuit," I should point out that we don't use that nomenclature in our circles. We know that hand in hand we are much bigger and broader than Pierre, stretching south to the Nebraska border and north to "the other" Dakota. Our people traverse the Rosebud Sioux Reservation and zigzag back and forth over the time zone as far west as Philip. As Circuit #3, we prefer to think of ourselves as the Circuit of the Holy Trinity, the place where the baptized live and move and have their being because His name abides among us not only in Pierre but throughout the vast expanse of His prairie creation. The Holy Trinity more accurately describes the work that's being done and sustained by grace. It certainly resonates with the number of triparishes that our pastors serve with distances between. My thanks to these pastors and the members who regularly hold up the prophets' hands in many and various ways. My thanks also to our pastors at Faith in Pierre for so often hosting us and providing us sanctuary on the prairie. It's an exciting time to see where the Holy Trinity is leading us in our future together.

Circuit 4 (Black Hills)

Reverend David Warner, Circuit Visitor

The salvation power of God's Gospel bears fruit in the Black Hills Circuit. As sinners gathered around the forgiveness of Christ, delivered through Word, Water, Wheat and Wine, the people and pastors of Circuit 4 are moved by the Good News to proclaim and celebrate the grace and mercy of God, revealed in the death and resurrection of Jesus, to love one another and our neighbors as Christ has loved us, and to work for the expansion of the Kingdom of God.

Both the most notable fruit and the most difficult setback for God's Kingdom in the Black Hills during the 2021 – 2024 period relate to the mission congregation in Belle Fourche. Following several years of development, Trinity Lutheran Church of Belle Fourche was founded and recognized by the LCMS as a member congregation. Pastor Don McKillop, who had been serving the mission, was called to pastor Trinity, his installation occurring May 21st, 2023. We give thanks for the many ways that the salvation power of the Gospel was proclaimed and distributed through Trinity, Belle Fourche.

It was a disappointment to all when in the spring of 2024 the congregation voted to close, due to various challenges that had confronted them. The church materials and furnishings of Trinity were distributed between Circuit congregations, and Pastor McKillop worked hard to ensure all the remaining members of Trinity got connected to other LCMS congregations. We give thanks for the work of the Holy Spirit through Pastor McKillop and all the saints at Trinity, Belle Fourche. Circuit 4 continues to work to strengthen the bonds between our congregations. Examples include a combined Circuit Forum and Convocation in August of 2022. We elected Synodical delegates, and heard Dr. Daniel Jastram present on the LCMS mission in Japan at Zion, Rapid City. The turnout was excellent.

Our circuit congregations also support the Rally Breakfast and Dinner served by Blessed Emmanuel, Sturgis. Members of circuit congregations have helped serve at the event for years. In 2021 Blessed Emmanuel asked for more substantial and organized support, and offered to

share the proceeds with the Circuit Pastors Conference. This new arrangement has worked well, and many members of our various congregations have become friends.

The Circuit Pastors Conference decided to create a Mission and Ministry Grant Fund with the monies received from the Rally Breakfast. Normally limited to \$500, these grants are intended to help Circuit congregations and other entities or persons within them with *local* mission and ministry needs and opportunities. Examples of grants include support for Circuit members attending seminary, VBS costs, community meal costs, and purchasing LCMS materials for evangelism training.

Zion Lutheran, Rapid City and Bethesda Lutheran, Hot Springs continue to proclaim the resurrection through their Lutheran schools. Zion is currently in a capital campaign to build new facilities to allow their school to expand. They are currently right at capacity for students and facility. And now Divine Shepherd, Black Hawk already running an Early Childhood Development Center, has added a primary school, using a classical one-room school model. Classes began in the Fall of 2024. Peace in Rapid City also attempted to re-open their Early Childhood Center in 2024. Due to severe building upgrade requirements, they were not able to do so.

As of the date of this writing, all Circuit 4 positions for ordained pastors are filled, for which we give thanks to the Lord of the Harvest. Circuit Visitor Rev. John Fries accepted a call to Kansas in 2022, and was replaced in November by Rev. David Warner.

Circuit 5 (Mitchell)

Reverend Ryan Loeslie, Circuit Visitor

The past three years have been enjoyable in the Mitchell Circuit. We are blessed to enjoy good unity in doctrine and practice while enjoying one another as pastors and congregations.

Our Winkel meets monthly for worship, fellowship, business, and study. We have been studying Martin Chemnitz's Church Order as a study in pastoral theology, while we have had a Greek study of the pastoral epistles, and now we have moved on to the book of James. Quite often our wives and children enjoy time with one another while the pastors have their meeting. This familial quality of our Winkel is a great strength, and we hope that continues.

Our congregations enjoy good stability in the Mitchell Circuit, though we certainly have challenges in this fallen world and a culture which is growing increasingly anti-Christian. Here is a short rundown on the ministry happening at our congregations:

St. John – Wolsey, Zion – Wessington Springs, and Mount Olive – Woonsocket continue to be served by Rev. Scott Spiehs and Rev. Richard Weeman.

Mount Calvary – Huron saw the departure of Rev. Chris Navurskis as Senior Pastor. Rev. Kevin Koester has moved into the position of Sole Pastor, while Rev. Dale Sattgast has provided part-time assistance in his retirement.

Zion – Mitchell established a vicarage program the summer of 2022. The Zion vicars have quickly become a fixture in the congregation, and they have greatly benefited from Rev. Daniel Grimmer's oversight. Zion is also busy building a brand new fellowship hall, which they hope will be completed by Christmas 2024.

I am grateful to the saints at Immanuel – Dimock over the past three years. Immanuel remains a steady and faithful congregation in the heart of the Mitchell Circuit. They have graciously supported my work as Circuit Visitor and more recently as vacancy pastor at Faith – Parkston.

Faith – Parkston said goodbye to Rev. Ken Soyk after 19 years of faithful service in the summer of 2023, as he entered retirement. Faith and St. Peter – Clayton formed an official dual parish that summer in preparation for the calling of their next pastor. After an extensive parsonage remodel and ten-month vacancy, Faith and St. Peter welcomed Rev. Joseph Greenmyer as their new pastor in 2024. We were glad to welcome Pastor Greenmyer back to the Mitchell Circuit, as he had served his vicarage at Zion – Mitchell.

Redeemer – Armour is served by Rev. Jens Jenson, who continues to serve as a reserve chaplain in the United States Air Force.

Zion – Delmont and Emmaus – Tripp continue to be served by Rev. Brian Lemcke.

St. Paul – Plankinton and Trinity – White Lake shared joint Sunday evening worship services led by Pastor Jenson for two and a half years. Now recently Rev. Don McKillop has picked up the vacancy work, taking residence in Plankinton.

Our congregations are largely composed of South Dakota Lutherans whose families have been in their churches for generations. They are honest people who are skilled and know well how to work the land and make a living in this part of God's creation. Though our people are very self-sufficient, God's Gospel power is very evident in the lives of our congregations. We know that the Gospel is God's good news to us in his Son, and we enjoy all the blessings of Christ through faith, not works. I have enjoyed my work as Circuit Visitor, counseling and encouraging these congregations who have many good works, and yet do not boast in them. With confidence in our pastors and congregations, I believe we will brave these turbulent times of the Christian church and come through stronger.

Vacant

I first of all want to thank the pastors of our Circuit, and of all the District, for their faithful service. As the years go on, the number of people in the pews in many of our rural congregations is dwindling, but the Church never shrinks and the elect Saints of God still gather around Word and Sacrament! Of all the blessings of this past triennium, the greatest is that Jesus is still being

preached into the ears of the Saints and by the hearing of that powerful Gospel faith is planted and grown unto eternal life.

The pastors and congregations of our circuit continue to rejoice in God's Gospel power to save as the eternally elect saints continue to gather around Word and Sacrament even as we have been hit with some challenges and received some blessed joys in the last trennium. We rejoice to have received three new congregations in our circuit after action of the last convention: Risen Savior in Tea, First English in Centerville, and Zion in Hurley. Pastors Domenichelli and Laskowsky are also blessings to our brotherhood in the circuit, and even though Pastor Domenichelli now serves as missionary and pastor in Germany, he remains a part of our circuit and in constant contact with his brother pastors. The circuit also joyfully received Rev. Joshua Mork and his wife, Samantha, at Josh's installation on July 14.

2023 saw a beloved pastor and friend in the circuit, Rev. Scott Lemmerman, serving Canistota and Montrose, called to glory on November 26, the first pastor in our circuit to die in office. But it was with Gospel hope that we gathered on December 23 for a memorial service at Zion in Canistota as the Saints gave thanks for Rev. Lemmerman's short but very faithful and appreciated pastorate in the parish. Since then we have had several of our pastors either accept calls to other parts of the Vineyard or resign due to health reasons. As this report is written we find ourselves in a position where we have only four called pastors still serving in our circuit — five of our 9 pastorates are vacant! But the Word and Sacrament ministry goes on and we trust God will soon fill again all the pulpits in our circuit.

The brother pastors of the circuit join in monthly Winkels and other gatherings and we have begun to reboot our circuit-wide congregational gatherings for worship, Bible Study, and fellowship that before 2020 we were doing three times a year, but just haven't got back to yet.

By God's grace the Gospel is still being preached to the joy and strengthening of God's elect saints in the Freeman circuit of our beloved South Dakota District. May God, through His blessed Means of Grace, keep us all in these difficult days and bring us at last to eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord!

Circuit 7 (Sioux Falls)

In the Sioux Falls Circuit, we are built on the powerful word of the Gospel. Salvation is proclaimed from the pulpits of our nine congregations. First, some of the major changes. Rev. Darren Olson was able to set the tone for Chaplaincy at our Sioux Falls Lutheran School (SFLS). Having taken a Call to serve the Lord elsewhere, the work of Chaplaincy has been carried by the ten association Church Workers: Pastors Aker, Ascher, Asmus, Drevlow, Newell, Rensner, and Slavens and DCEs Peters and Miller along with Deaconess Korthase. Although the might and power of God through the Gospel remains constant, those He raises to lead His congregations changes. In addition to Pastor Olson taking a Call, Pastor Meyer retired and Lord of Life Called Pastor Newell to lead them in their Gospel work in East Sioux Falls. Lord of Life is the one SF congregation offering exclusively contemporary worship, led and loved by their members. Pastor Drevlow received a Call and Deaconess Korthase got married and moved out of the area making Our Redeemer our circuit's sole vacancy. Revs. Shane and Morfitt have served admirably in their time of vacancy and their leaders continue to ensure the Gospel is proclaimed and the worship life remains vibrant! We are proud of our association school which has seen considerable growth - 40% in the last five years! This means new teachers and staff, new students and families, and new building projects. Executive Director, Tia Esser, and SFLS fearlessly instills the love of Christ's Gospel each day in their thriving community. Living righteously by faith, Blessed Redeemer has tirelessly focused on proclaiming Christ to the people of Brandon, adding Saturday night worship and continuing to share the love of Jesus with the children of their preschool. Change is on the horizon for Blessed Redeemer as their faithful shepherd, Pastor

Deardoff, plans to retire. Their mother church, Faith, continues their work of unashamedly proclaiming the Gospel to the Sioux Falls Whittier neighborhood, led by Pastors Aker and Rensner. For two summers, their VBS was taken to the neighborhood. Hosting kids from the neighborhood and congregation, the righteous of Faith brought the Bible to life on the Whittier Middle School football field. Serving the NE part of town, **Christ** is ably pointing their faithful to focus on Christ alone through active, vibrant worship. Pastor Nix serves as their pastor along with his work in Trinity Church of the Deaf, a fine outreach of the SD District! From NW to SW Sioux Falls, Pastor Ascher serves as pastor to the saints of Resurrection where they have a wonderful Childcare Center called His Ark. In addition to his duties as part-time theology teacher at SFLS, Pastor Ascher is serving the vacancy in Hartford. The generosity of God's saints from Resurrection pours out into the community! Central to Sioux Falls and mother of all our congregations, Zion continues to forge new connections into the community through their Gospel outreach - Streets of Bethlehem, childcare center, vibrant children's ministry led by Chez Shoup, excellent youth ministry led by Jacob Shoup, and engaging worship for all ages led by Pastor Lehr and Jacob. Rounding us out is Memorial to the south. Recent upgrades to the campus have been enjoyed by one of our District's largest congregations. Dedicated to ministering to all ages, DCE Peters oversees the children's ministry and DCE Miller oversees Youth ministry. Pastors Asmus and Slavens, who also serves as a part-time theology teacher at SFLS, have been partnering in their leadership amongst the active saints of Memorial. Here we find another congregation soon to experience change as Pastor Asmus will be retiring this spring. Many of our congregations also support African ministries and/or childcare/pre-school and we are actively looking for when, where, and how to plant new ministries. The Sioux Falls Circuit joyfully joins the rest of our SD District in fearlessly proclaiming the Gospel!

Circuit 8 (Yankton)

By God's salvation power, the saints of the Yankton Circuit continue to be strengthened by the Gospel of Jesus Christ through the power of Word and Sacrament ministry. We are thankful for the faithful service of the ordained and commissioned ministers in the Yankton Circuit to empower God's people with the Gospel of Jesus Christ crucified and risen from the dead.

Peace Lutheran, Alcester welcomed Rev. Don Erickson on May 29, 2022 after Rev. Brent Keller accepted a Call to Trinity Lutheran, Guttenberg and St. Paul Lutheran, McGregor, IA in the January 2022. Rev. Paul Warnier, Pastor Emeritus, served the vacancy.

Zion Lutheran, Avon and Our Savior's Lutheran, Springfield is served by Rev. Ken Johnson. Zion in particular, despite its small-town setting, has a number of young families and children strengthening their congregation.

Holy Cross Lutheran, Dakota Dunes welcomed back Rev. Dr. Michael Kumm (after retiring in 2018) as Assistant Pastor on January 16, 2022, along with Senior Pastor, Rev. Jeremy Richert. Holy Cross Lutheran Preschool continues to serve the community with the Gospel.

St. John's Lutheran, Tyndall and Martinus Lutheran, Utica is served by Rev. Dean Schroeder. Martinus, like Zion, Avon, also has a vibrant ministry of young families and children while being in a very rural setting.

Concordia Lutheran, Vermillion, served by Rev. Matthew Bless, has seen growth and increased participation with its campus ministry to students at the University of South Dakota.

St. John's Lutheran, Wagner and Trinity Lutheran, Fairfax, bid farewell and Godspeed to Rev. Bill Heermann, who retired in June 2024 after St. John's, Wagner celebrated its 125th Anniversary with District President, Rev. Dr. Scott Sailer as the guest preacher. Despite its rural setting, Trinity also sees a number of young families and children participating in the congregation's life. The

vacancy is served by Rev. Ken Johnson in Wagner and Rev. Clark Gies, Pastor Emeritus, in Fairfax.

St. John's Lutheran, Yankton welcomed Rev. Dr. Jacob Bobby as Associate Pastor on January 28, 2024 after Rev. Levi Willms accepted a Call to Trinity Lutheran, Sauk Rapids, MN in May 2023. The congregation celebrated its 140th Anniversary with festivities in October 2022, with former pastor emeritus Rev. Dave Gunderson as the guest preacher. St. John's Lutheran Preschool continues to share the Gospel with young children and their families in the Yankton area, and is working toward re-accreditation. St. John's is also served by Senior Pastor Rev. Steve Weispfennig and DCE Josh Schmitt.

Deaconess Andra Gates completed her service as a winter deaconess at Concordia Lutheran, Sarasota, FL in 2023. She continued to assist the pastors of the Yankton Circuit, especially St. John's, Yankton, until accepting a Call to Redeemer Lutheran, Mountain Home, AR in September 2024.

Following Circuit Realignment at the 2021 South Dakota District Convention, the parish of First English Lutheran, Centerville, and Zion Lutheran, Hurley were relocated to Circuit 6 (Freeman).

The Ordained and Commissioned workers of the circuit meet regularly for "Winkel" gatherings. At the Winkel, they worship and celebrate the Lord's Supper together, share ministry joys and concerns, and study the Gospel of Mark. Other matters of casuistry and study are taken up as needed. The church workers and their families also gather for an annual summer event (picnic or minor league baseball game) and Christmas party. The 2024 Circuit Convocation welcomed retired DCE Mark Schoepp presenting on "Caring for Aging Parents."

Assistant to the President (Executive Secretary)

Position: Assistant to the President (Executive Secretary)

Position General Description & Purpose:

- A. Serve as the Assistant to the District President in getting to know the pastors and congregations and their needs, challenges, and opportunities. He will especially seek to visit with and encourage pastors as they carry out their ministries. He will also serve in various other administrative capacities in order to help carry out the responsibilities and programs of the District.
- B. Serve as the primary District staff member promoting God's mission of making disciples of all nations and of seeking and saving the lost, and in promoting the call of the Christian to serve our neighbors with deeds of love.
- C. Provide accountability and oversight for District-subsidized ministries in our responsibility of carrying out the mission opportunities our Lord puts before us.
- D. Serve as the supervisor of the Mission and Ministry Council (*per 2021 District Res. 2-04A*) or whatever structure succeeds it in providing support and ministry resources to church workers, congregations, and schools.
- E. Ensure that Biblical principles of stewardship are promoted throughout the District (per Synod Bylaw 4.6).

Working Relationships:

Responsible to the District President, and under the supervision of the Board of Directors.

Term of Service:

The Board of Directors shall normally appoint the Executive Secretary for a 3-year term, which shall expire at the time of one of the meetings of the Board of Directors held within six months of the completion of the District Convention. The Executive Secretary shall be appointed from a list of candidates provided by the District President and approved by the Board of Directors. At the close of each term, the incumbent shall be eligible to be appointed again. When the term of office of the Executive Secretary expires after a District Convention, and the President recommends that a different person serve as the Executive Secretary, the incumbent may continue to serve until a new Executive Secretary is installed. In the event that the incumbent is not appointed or declines his reappointment, his salary and benefits shall be provided until he accepts another position or for a period not to exceed six months.

Duties and Responsibilities:

- A. Work as the Assistant to the District President
 - Assist the President in getting to know the pastors and congregations, and report to the President the needs, challenges and opportunities that our workers and ministries are experiencing.
 - 2. Visit with and encourage pastors as they carry out their ministries.
 - 3. Serve as the director of the Lay Leadership Institute (arranging for instructors, promoting and scheduling classes).
 - 4. Serve as the director of Student Aid.
 - 5. Attend the annual gathering of Mission Executives and/or Stewardship Executives of the LCMS.

- 6. Attend and report at the meetings of the District Board of Directors, serving as an advisory member of the Board.
- 7. Request quarterly reports from District-subsidized ministries, review the reports, and inform the Board of Directors as to the vitality and activities of the ministries.
- 8. Perform an annual evaluation of all called District-subsidized ministries and staff for District budget, and seek budget recommendations from them.
- 9. Assist with the call process for workers in District-subsidized ministries.
- 10. Connect with LCMS organizations that resource this position, such as the Synod's Offices of International and National Mission (OIM, ONM).
- 11. Carry out miscellaneous responsibilities, as requested by the District President and the Board of Directors.
- B. Work in Promoting God's Mission of Making Disciples and of the Christian's Obligation of Serving our Neighbor
 - 1. Promote the mission work determined by District Convention or District Board of Directors' action, such as Together in Mission (TIM) and church planting efforts.
 - 2. With the assistance of the Mission and Ministry Council, strengthen congregations and their members in proclaiming the Gospel in their home, workplace, community, and congregation.
 - With the assistance of the Mission and Ministry Council, equip and encourage individuals, congregations, and circuits in expressing their Christian concern, love, and compassion in meeting human needs to engage their community and world.
 - 4. Encourage collaboration and healthy partnerships with mission organizations, groups, and congregations, helping to identify a variety of ministry partners and resources, and connecting these to congregations and ministries.
 - 5. Evaluate the need for new ministries within the District and work within the District policies and procedures to advance new ministry opportunities.
- C. Work with District-Subsidized Ministries
 - 1. Regular visitation with all District-subsidized ministry church workers to assess and respond to their spiritual, relational, emotional, physical, and educational needs.
 - 2. Provide the first line level of accountability for District-subsidized ministries, workers, and grant recipients, assisting them to keep activities within the policies and budget of the District.
- D. Work with the Mission and Ministry Council (or whatever structure succeeds it)
 - 1. Assist the District President and 1st Vice-President in recruiting members of the Council

EDUCATION EXECUTIVE (PART-TIME) JOB DESCRIPTION

Ministry Description

South Dakota District--LCMS
Education Executive (a part-time position)

The Education Executive position is part-time (20 hours or less) and may be done remotely. It is a contracted position, without benefits, and it may be filled by an LCMS rostered minister-commissioned, an LCMS rostered minister-ordained, or an LCMS layperson. The Education Executive is accountable to the District's Board of Directors and is under the supervision of the District President. The Board of Directors shall set the salary annually. Travel expenses within the District and to authorized Synod meetings and LEA convocations are covered by the District.

Responsibilities:

This person shall serve as the primary District staff member providing resources, direction, and encouragement to the schools of the District, to their faculties and staffs, and to LCMS-rostered commissioned ministers serving in the District. To that end, he or she will:

- 1. Support the early childhood centers and preschools by communicating with their directors and teachers, an on-site visit to each annually or every other year, and by providing resources.
- 2. Support the Lutheran schools, especially by communicating with their administrators, an on-site visit to each, and by providing resources.
- 3. Assist the Lutheran schools and congregations in the call process and developing call lists, when calling commissioned ministers of religion.
- 4. Ensure that planning for the Fall Teachers' Conference is being done.
- 5. Stay informed concerning the activities of the South Dakota Christian Schools Association.
- 6. Stay informed concerning the federal and state legislation impacting private education.
- 7. Encourage and check on the well-being of the called Directors of Christian Education and deaconesses.
- 8. Give an in-person or written report to the regular meetings of the District's Board of Directors, serving as an advisory member of the Board.

- Serve as a member of the District's Mission and Ministry Council or whatever structure succeeds it.
- 10. Attend the annual meeting of education executives of the Synod.
- 11. Attend the occasional Lutheran Education Association (LEA) convocations.
- 12. Serve as the NLSA commissioner of the District.
- 13. Other duties as assigned.

Term of Service:

The Board of Directors shall normally appoint the Education Executive for a 3-year term, which shall expire at the time of one of the meetings of the Board of Directors held within six months of the completion of the District Convention. The Education Executive shall be appointed from a list of candidates provided by the District President and approved by the Board of Directors. At the close of each term, the incumbent shall be eligible to be appointed again. When the term of office of the Education Executive expires after a District Convention, and the President recommends that a different person serve as the Education Executive, the incumbent may continue to serve until such time as a contract is accepted and a new Education Executive is installed.

Assistant to the President's Report

Reverend Paul Winckler, Assistant to the President

The 63rd Convention of the South Dakota District of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod gathers under the banner of Romans 1:16-17. The heart of this passage, indeed the heart of all scripture, is Jesus and the assurance and confidence given to all who believe in Him.

In October 2022 I accepted the call as Assistant to the District President, moving into this new position not entirely certain of all that the future may hold, but moving forward in the hope of that assurance and confidence of Jesus, knowing that He who begins all things will bring all things to completion according to His good will.

Having been a life-long South Dakotan, I knew quite a bit about our state but I knew that there would be much more to learn. I have been blessed, over these last two years, to have you all, pastors and people, teach me more about your ministries and your communities. It is a privilege to have so many of you invite me to come to your congregations on Sundays to preach and lead studies. I have had the opportunity to fill the pulpits of 43 of our congregations (some multiple times!), providing opportunities for pastors to take time away to be with family or recover from illness or attend to the many responsibilities of the office, as well as giving some of our vacancy pastors an occasional respite.

The beautiful thing about our LCMS fellowship is that we are not a "top-down" organization. As President Sailer often says, in our Synod the "congregation is queen" and we in District or Synod have the honor of advising, not directing, the queen. It is a joy to fill this role of advisor in many capacities.

Over the last two years I have had the opportunity to facilitate connection with our District and the services of the Synod to support the good work being done by our congregations. We have hosted Rev. Dr. Mark Wood from the Office of National Mission twice to discuss tools and services in the areas of strategic planning, congregational ReVitality, witness and outreach, as well as church planting. Tools such as these have proven invaluable for congregations for effective planning.

God has blessed our District with many gifts, chief among these are God's people. A people who are certainly not ashamed of the Gospel but boldly answer the call to serve, share, and support. The gift of dedicated volunteers who desire to grow in faith, serve the congregation, and support the pastor through studying in the Lay Leadership Institute. The gift of revenue from farmland owned by the District has helped me and dozens of sons and daughters of our District attend colleges and seminaries to study for full-time church work vocations.

The Mission and Ministry Council has been a special blessing to our District, pulling together dedicated lay-leaders and church workers from across South Dakota and pulling in resources from across the Synod to examine and address needs and opportunities to work together boldly in the mission of the Gospel. There is certainly more to say and more reasons to celebrate, especially those highlights found in reports from Missionaries, Native American Ministry, Deaf Ministry, and Campus Ministry.

We look back with joy, giving thanks to God for his many blessings and we look ahead with hope and confidence in the blessings of God our Father who gives great gifts, God the Son who has redeemed us, and God the Holy Spirit who calls us and equips us to be bold in faith, love, service and witness.

Mission and Ministry Council

Krista Erickson, Chairman

Established by the 2021 Convention, the Mission & Ministry Council has been joyfully centered on the saving power of the Gospel while working to provide support and resources to church workers, congregations, schools, and other ministries in our District. The Council is currently comprised of ten representatives from all eight circuits—a combination of pastors, commissioned workers, and lay members—as well as four advisory members: our District President, First Vice President, Assistant to the President, and Education Executive.

As a new council, we first examined the purpose of the Mission & Ministry Council as stated in the Convention resolution and learned about previous structures for providing resources and support within our District. We participated in a presentation on the church's mission and explored the needs of our neighbors and of our church workers, congregations, schools, and other ministries, being mindful of the wonderful work already being done in these areas. This set the tone for the group to further study, prioritize, and address both needs and opportunities. Reports at each meeting from national youth leaders, mental and physical health professionals, our missionaries to Native Americans, church worker development leaders, rural and small town ministry workers, and more provide us the opportunity to gather and process information, generate ideas, and prayerfully plan as a body.

The Council has identified five Ministry Areas which encompass current ministries and projects: Mission; Youth & Young Adult; Mercy & Human Care; Education & Discipleship; and Congregational Vitality & Support. The Mission & Ministry Council serves to support these areas and to encourage and assist with collaboration. We have held focus groups in each of these areas, inviting various ministry leaders to share their experience and ideas, and hope to expand this to create a larger network for engaging and partnering in ministry. Furthermore, God has generously provided a wealth of wonderful resources, and we have tasked ourselves with both providing an accessible, easy-to-use list of those resources and facilitating the means of delivery.

P.A.S.S. It On! is one such way in which the Mission & Ministry Council is delivering ideas and inspiration for mission and ministry. This annual workshop is designed to supply our church workers and lay members with the knowledge and tools for serving the Lord and our neighbors while proclaiming the salvation power of the Gospel. Rev. Dr. Michael Zeigler of the Lutheran Hour was the plenary speaker for the 2023 inaugural event, and breakout sessions included the topics of evangelism, youth ministry, finance, church leadership, mental wellness, caring for church workers, and stewardship. The 2024 event focused on the intersection of faith and culture, with Rev. Dr. Greg Seltz from the Lutheran Center for Religious Liberty delivering the keynote address. Other presentations centered on truth, identity, and purpose; defending the faith; and a Biblical response to LGBTQ, followed by a panel discussion and Q&A. It is an incredible blessing to provide these events at no cost to attendees, and the turnout and feedback have been overwhelmingly positive.

The development of Men's Ministry is another exciting way in which the Council is working. In 2023 Peace Lutheran in Brookings hosted a men's retreat, with retired SDSU football coach John Stiegelmeier encouraging men to live their faith boldly. The 2024 "Man Up!" retreat took place at Campfire Cabins in the Black Hills, with fellowship activities, a servant event, and inspiration for men to lead as faithful followers of Christ. Look for more to come!

We are truly inspired by and grateful for the many faithful servants with whom God has so graciously blessed our District and look forward to continuing His Kingdom work with you!

Your archivists have been storing that information in District archives with the able assistance of President Sailer, Assistant to the President Winckler, Mr. Chad Zinnel, and Mrs. Julie Pike. Duties also include getting archival/historical information out to interested parties, in SD and all across the nation for that matter, when there are questions about past marriages, confirmations, baptisms and funerals. Feel free to contact us whenever you need any sort of records or information from the District. We'll do our best to dig it up.

We have also been organizing and updating records for our District congregations on an ongoing basis. Generally, congregations keep their own records but when a congregation closes its doors after ministering God's Word and Sacraments to their communities for many decades, records come to the archivists. Do contact us when you have questions about any historical documents we may have at the District office having to do with an active or "retired" congregation.

As your SD District LCMS archivists, we are here to serve you. Let us know when we can be of assistance to you as we work together to serve the Lord in His Kingdom, on our way to Glory!

Sioux Falls Hospital Chaplaincy Program

What an honor it is to be able to share the love of Christ with people I may have never met before. As your hospital chaplain, I try to share the comfort and peace of God with those who may be feeling no comfort and little peace. Nobody wants to be in the hospital. We all want to be healthy and able to enjoy the life we have been blessed with. But when times of physical, mental or spiritual pain happen, God's Word is able to bring comfort and peace.

Over these past four years, the visits have been many. Let me share just a few with you. The birth of a child is supposed to be a time of great joy. But when that birth happens long before the due date, that joy can be shattered. But that shattered joy can be restored if you have skilled medical staff and a caring pastor. The pastor was able to baptize the child soon after the birth, the medical staff was able to care for both mother and child over the next few months and I was blessed to be able to share Jesus until they were able to leave the hospital and go home. Another someone needing surgery, being told that the odds of surviving the surgery were minimal at best. Visiting with them and their family and seeing the faith they have regardless of the outcome. Then, being able to visit when everything went well and the doctors almost couldn't believe it. Being able to be there when someone is in a bed they will never get out of while their parents and child sit nearby. Sharing the promises of meeting again on the last day. What a comfort God is for those who trust in Him.

I would like to encourage you to remember me when you or someone you know is going to be in one of our Sioux Falls' hospitals. It is almost impossible to get a list of LCMS patients anymore. Please contact me so that I am able to visit. Also, if you are in one of our hospitals let the chaplain there know that you are LCMS and would like a visit by an LCMS chaplain. Church Worker Education Debt Assistance (CWEDA)

Rev. Dr. Scott C. Sailer, for the District Board of Directors

Since it was established by action of the 2004 District Convention, the Church Worker Education Debt Assistance fund – or CWEDA – has provided grants to rostered church workers in The South Dakota District. Such grants are needed by our pastors, teachers, deaconesses, and DCEs because most of the new workers coming into our District are bearing significant debt from four to seven years of payments for tuition and housing from their college and seminary training. Typically, each of the workers assisted through CWEDA brings from \$30,000-80,000 in such debt with them into their brand-new ministries in South Dakota. A few bear more than \$100,000 in debt. With beginning salaries for brand-new pastors in South Dakota being around \$40,000, and salaries for new commissioned ministers in the low to mid-\$30,000s, it is easy to see that such debt is difficult for them to manage. Therefore, the CWEDA grants have been a tremendous blessing to our church workers.

The grants are funded by undesignated gifts to the District. In addition, there is a small CWEDA endowment fund, totaling about \$29,000. Congregations, church groups, and individuals are encouraged to consider a gift to the CWEDA endowment fund.

The Board of Directors set aside \$20,000 for CWEDA grants in 2021 and 2022. In the summer of 2022, the Board authorized a "bonus" awarding of grants, in addition to the normal year-end awarding of grants. In 2023 and 2024, the Board set aside \$40,000 each year.

The increases in 2023 and 2024, along with the "bonus" grants in 2022, were the result of the adoption of 2021 District Convention Res. 1-07, "To Allow Grants from the District Assistance Fund to Church Workers to Pay Down Student Loans." The resolution authorizes the Board of Directors of the District "to annually transfer a portion of the balance of the Assistance fund to be used to supplement the Church Worker Educational Debt Assistance grants."

Here is a listing of the number of grants and the average grant amount for the past four years:

- 2021: 13 grants awarded (12 pastors and 1 commissioned minister) \$1,538 average grant
 2022: 14 grants awarded (11 pastors and 3 commissioned ministers) \$1,500 average grant
 Summer of 2022 "bonus" grants: 10 grants (7 pastors, 3 commissioned) \$1,800 average grant
- 2023: 10 grants awarded (7 pastors and 3 commissioned ministers) \$4,000 average grant
- 2024: 5 grants awarded (4 pastor and 1 commissioned minister) \$4,000 average grant.

The Lord has graciously given us full-time workers in the Church. His generous people in the District have been the Lord's instruments to assist these workers in this special way with CWEDA grants. I join these workers in the District in expressing our thanks to you for this needed, tangible support!

Lay Leadership Institute

Reverend Paul Winckler, Assistant to the President

In 2007 the South Dakota District inaugurated the Lay Leadership Institute with the goal of strengthening laity the in faith and equipping them to serve as leaders in their congregations. Since it's inception dozens of laypeople have enrolled in the programs, including some men who have moved into the pastoral ministry through the seminaries and SMP.

LLI classes are offered on a Fall/Spring semester schedule and the cost remains \$200 per participant. To complete the program participants enroll in nine classes. Courses are taught by Pastors and DCE's of the District and include in-person learning opportunities combined with electronic and teleconference class meetings.

Over the last triennium five classes were offered and 29 students enrolled in classes. Among those students, two successfully completed the entirety of the course and many more are on the way to achieving completion.

New to the LLI program over these last years has been the combination of the "Worship" and "Homiletics" classes into one "Proclaiming the Gospel in Worship" class. This new class focuses on reading a prepared sermon text instead of students writing their own sermon.

A special thank you to all who helped with the LLI classes over the triennium, including our instructors: DCE Joshua Schmitt, Rev. Christopher Navurskis, Rev. Kevin Koester, Rev. Dr. Brian Mosemann, Rev. Micah Bauer, and Rev. Tim Rynearson. Thank also to Rev. Sam Handschke and the people of Faith Lutheran in Pierre as well as Rev. Kevin Koester and the people of Mt. Calvary Lutheran in Huron for hosting classes.

TOGETHER IN MISSIONReverend Dr. Daniel Jastram, Missionary to Japan and Asia

Dear Pastors and Congregations of the South Dakota District:

As an LCMS missionary kid born and raised in Japan, I always had difficulty answering the question "Where are you from?" Hartford, South Dakota was my family home in the States where we always came for furloughs. Niigata Japan was my family home overseas where my parents served as missionaries. These two "homes" each have exerted a life-long influence for my current missionary work in Japan.

After graduating from my international high school in Tokyo Japan I returned to Hartford and Sioux Falls. Then following college in Vermillion, seminary, graduate school, and a call into LCMS ministry as professor and pastor, I followed in the footsteps of my father and accepted this call as a missionary to Japan where I have now served for eight and a half years.

My parents, after twenty-three years of LCMS missionary work in Japan, had returned to the States in 1976 to serve at Emmanuel Gettysburg, South Dakota. They and their colleagues left behind in Japan a well-established Lutheran partner church body with over 30 Japanese congregations, about 30 Japanese pastors, two Japanese Lutheran high schools, and one jointly owned and operated seminary in Tokyo.

However, in the following decades, liberal theology overcame the Japan Lutheran Church. After more than fifty years of considering women's ordination, and under the influence of liberal Lutheran church bodies and entities, and after a dozen years of dedicated theological dialog and brotherly admonition from the LCMS, the Japan Lutheran Church finally broke relations with the LCMS in 2021 by officially adopting the ordination of women as pastors.

As that break was officially recognized by the 2023 LCMS convention, our Japan mission work took on a new direction. Instead of supporting the previous church body partner, we now focus on three goals: 1) to provide regular worship services in Japan faithful to sound Lutheran doctrine and practice; 2) to manage translation work of Lutheran theological resources; 3) to nurture relations with local Lutheran pastors who desire to be faithful to the Scriptures and the Lutheran Confessions.

Over the past eight and a half years, God has richly blessed this work in Japan. During my initial mission support raising, South Dakota District congregations became generous partners through my visitation of 42 out of the 114 district congregations.

This support made it possible to establish our mission station in Tokyo and to begin work on our current mission goals. We provide regular Divine Services of Word and Sacrament at three different worship sites. We manage the translation of substantive theological texts now reaching nine titles. We nurture close relations with six identified Japanese Lutheran pastors dedicated to sound Lutheran teaching and practice. One of these six is currently enrolled in the Ph.D. Missiology intensive study curriculum at our LCMS seminary. One serves at our LCMS "sister congregation" in Kobari Niigata. And three eagerly look forward to official theological dialog with the LCMS to clarify specific points of unity in doctrine and practice.

Mission efforts like these depend on your generous Together In Mission (TIM) district partnership. Your partnership, and the additional sustaining contributions of individuals, congregations, and LWML groups make this mission work possible. As the sole LCMS missionary currently serving in Japan, I thank you.

Thank you, thank you, for your TIM partnership and for the contributions of individuals and church groups throughout the South Dakota District.

TOGETHER IN MISSION Reverend Jonah Domenichelli, Missionary to Germany

Dear pastors and congregations of the South Dakota District:

It is truly a joy to work with you as partners in delivering the Gospel: God's power unto salvation, to those living abroad in an area of the world where we would expect the good news of Christ to be present.

In 2020, I was ordained and was called by Christ to serve the beloved saints of a small rural congregation in Tea, SD for the first three years of my ministry. Just shy of a year ago, in November 2023, I was called through the LCMS Office of International Missions (OIM) to serve as a career missionary in Germany to plant a church where Word and Sacrament ministry is sorely lacking. To my surprise the specific mission target was not German nationals as you might suspect, but rather US men, women and children, living in Germany, near and around Spangdahlem Air Base, a US air base with lots of DoD, military, and expatriate personnel around that location. That is not to say that I would not or could not serve German nationals, only that my focus are those US persons (your sons, daughters, grandchildren, etc...) who have been sent to serve in Germany at the behest of the US government or simply living abroad, who are in desperate need of the Gospel received through real, tangible Word and Sacrament ministry.

As a retired Airman of the US Air Force, and having lived in Germany before, I felt this call was important because I had experienced a similar situation when I served in this country. I received my orders to serve in Germany in 2007. I went willingly in service of my country taking along my wife and my 11-month-old son. What I did not expect was that even though I was moving to "the-land-of-Luther," I would be confronted with a very secular culture and a huge limitation to receive faithful Word and Sacrament ministry. That is not to say we don't have faithful LCMS chaplains who are serving around the world, but at the time my family and I were stationed in Germany, there was not a faithful LCMS pastor available to serve us, nor a body of believers we could be in full fellowship with. In many ways this left us lonely and without a strong cohort of Lutherans to help us through some of the most difficult and strenuous times in our life.

This new call brings with it challenges and struggles, but also joy, thanksgiving and praise to our living God. On June 1, 2024, we arrived in country with nothing but suitcases. Within 1 week of

arrival, we were able to find an adequate home for our family to live in, thanks be to God! It's fitting place to live, as the distances between our mission location and the children's school were the important factors to finding the right home for our family. We enrolled our children in the nearest international school and we spent the first two months working on the paperwork to establish residency in Germany, find vehicles sufficient for our family, and furnish our home with the necessary items such as beds, a table and kitchen supplies. As we worked toward getting ourselves established, I also worked toward coming up with a plan for planting a church near Spangdahlem AB, Germany, and acquiring the necessary items to hold Divine Service. As we planned our way, the Lord established our steps. I coordinated with the Kaiserslautern Evangelical Lutheran Church (KELC), an LCMS sponsored, English-speaking congregation located in Kaiserslautern, Germany near Ramstein Air Base, to assist with identifying LCMS families living near Spangdahlem AB. Upon identifying three families, I contacted each of them to determine their desire to be a part of a new church plant closer to their area. Each family agreed with joy. Four families in total, including the Domenichelli family, came together through Word and Sacrament to form a new congregation in the Spangdahlem area. At the time of submitting this letter in October 2024, for publication in the 2025 South Dakota District Convention Workbook, we have held four Divine Services with six Bible Studies with this new church plant congregation since September 1, 2024.

So, I give thanks to God for you dear saints of the South Dakota District for the support you have provided thus far. Your partnership in the Gospel matters. We could not have made it here, set up a place to live, and begun working on this church plant without your faithful prayers and offerings to God on our behalf through the Together In Mission (TIM) program. Your mission dollars matter. We thank God for everything that He has provided. The growth of this new church plant is His workmanship through His saving Gospel. Together we are witnessing the work of the Holy Spirit who calls, gathers, enlightens and sanctifies His people into the body of Christ. The same body you dear saints are a part of and receive the Gospel into your ears and mouths for you every Lord's Day. Please continue steadfast in these things and greet each other with the love of Christ on our behalf.

Dear Brothers and Sisters of the South Dakota District,

"Căci mie nu mi-e rușine de Evanghelia lui Hristos, fiindcă ea este puterea lui Dumnezeu pentru mântuirea fiecăruia care crede..." Romani 1:16

"For I am not ashamed of the Gospel (of Christ), for it is the power of God for salvation of everyone who believes..." Romans 1:16

It is with joy that I am granted to share this report not only as a former pastor of the district, but now as your missionary serving as a Church Planter and Theological Educator with the budding Confessional Lutheran Church of Romania.

These words of St. Paul are words of promise and exhortation for us as the people of God. They are words of promise and strength as we do not see the efforts of the church through human invention or strategy, but rather in terms of God's work in Christ. We faithfully administer and trust God to work through His promised Means of Grace to bring about faith and salvation. When questions arise, we do not turn to our wisdom, but the Word of Christ. We do not seek to preach something new or better than what Jesus preached. We seek to hold fast to the confession that we have received. Jesus himself only proclaimed what He was given from the Father we are not above our teacher! This is true in Romania as it is in Africa, Asia and in South Dakota!

At the time of my writing this report (October 2024) we are only now preparing to depart for Braşov, Romania. We have been deployed to St. Louis spending time learning Romanian as we

awaited the birth of our son Simeon. It has been a blessing for all this to take place before moving overseas. It will indeed be a blessing as we move and adjust to life in Romania. Even more, to be about the work of proclaiming Christ clearly! By the time this report is available for the convention I will, God willing, be further acquainted with and increasingly involved in the evangelistic work in Romania, Moldova, Bulgaria and Greece and elsewhere! As we do this work it is in this simple reality of God's promise and work through His Word and Sacraments. This is only our work in that God has called us to preach and teach without shame. He is the one who will work faith through His promised means. That is our trust and that is the lens through which we work and see what He is doing.

This too is your place and work. It may have greater complexities in a District and congregations much larger than are present here, but the truth is the same. The same danger to doubt God's work, the same danger to lean on our own understanding exists there as here. The same danger for other things to remove our gaze and focus from God's Word and promises. God works where and when He pleases through the Word and Sacraments, we are called by Him to be faithful. These are not things for which we are ashamed, but the source of confidence and faith in Christ Jesus who is the Savior of the World! We look to Christ, we cling to His forgiveness and we give a defense for the hope that is within us until He returns.

May the Lord bless you all and grant that we all remain steadfast in the Truth of Christ until He comes!

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ of the Beloved South Dakota District,

I submit this report with all humility and joy, ever thankful and amazed at God's work in and through His church. I commend President Sailer for choosing such a befitting theme for this year's convention. Like St. Paul, how can we be ashamed of such a great salvation? The gospel truly is the power of God who, through the Word made flesh, brings us eternal gifts well beyond our sinful imagination.

I wish to inform you of the work God is doing here in Riga, Latvia by utilizing your convention theme. The gospel is the power of God for salvation to all who believe, and I see that power manifesting itself in the work God has put before me and the rest of the missionaries at Luther Academy, Riga, Latvia. One mark of God's gospel power has been trust. On the mission field, so much is out of your control, so God calls you back over and over to your baptismal promises and teaches you to trust Him.

But this trust extends well beyond me individually. Luther Academy is the seminary for the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Latvia (ELCL), a church with whom we in the LCMS have been in fellowship since 2002. In 2018, one of their bishops came across a new law that allowed an accredited educational institution within a European Union (EU) country to extend its accredited program to all the countries of the EU *if* that program introduced an English-speaking component. That is how the LCMS became involved. Leadership in the LCMS realized for some time that sending potential pastors from the Eurasia region to ecumenical seminaries resulted in pastors with poor doctrine and very little practical training. This new law would give the LCMS an opportunity to partner with the ELCL and provide an accredited professional seminary degree.

This is where so much of what followed was simply trusting in the Lord because of the Savior and gospel we shared. Through the extensive work of missionaries prior to me arriving, a reduced residency seminary offered in English was formed. Would students enroll? They had to trust the Lord! That trust was not in vain. Students from all over the region enrolled, and within a couple of

years these missionaries had well over 20 students studying through this fledgling confessional Lutheran seminary program located in the heart of the Baltic region.

I was called to Luther Academy to teach classes on Lutheran doctrine. Since arriving, I have also taken on the roll of chaplain and Director of Vicarage. This year we have 26 total students from 16 different countries. These students are men from all walks of life who will go back to their churches and regions to proclaim the gospel as the power of God for salvation just like St. Paul says. I work with them and the pastors from their home congregations to ensure that the vicarage process is effective and faithful. I organize all our Monday evening chapel services, and I teach our students the importance of the Lutheran Confessions and sound doctrine.

I cannot overstate the potential impact Luther Academy could have throughout Eurasia. Each of these pastors will spend the rest of their days, God willing, shepherding their flocks, witnessing to Christ through the life of the church, and teaching, training, and counseling people in God's word. Each soul is precious to God, and the work done through Luther Academy, through each pastor God sends from here, has the prospect of claiming innumerable men, women, and children for Christ. Will that happen by necessity? No, but I trust that God will bring it to completion because of the gospel and the power that gospel engenders.

Another manifestation of the power of the Gospel is thankfulness. My family and I are thankful for you and for the support you provide. This thankfulness is not mere words but a deep recognition that we are joined by our common need for Jesus and our common desire for all to be saved and come to the knowledge of our Lord. We continue in this joint gospel venture with all of you because of all of you. Thank you.

We here at Luther Academy will see our first class graduate next spring, and we are very excited. You should be excited too. These pastors go out because of your partnership and commitment and because all of us trust the power of the gospel to accomplish that for which God sent it.

TOGETHER IN MISSION Reverend Cory Rajek Office of International Mission, Missionary – Eurasia Region, Riga, Latvia

"Be strong and courageous ... for it is the Lord your God who goes with you. He will not leave you or forsake you." (Deuteronomy 31:6)

The words above are part of Moses' great goodbye spoken to the people of Israel as he prepared to hand over leadership to Joshua. Moses served his purpose. He led the people of Israel out of slavery in Egypt, through the forty years of wilderness wandering, and to the shores of the Promised Land. But, with the Lord's good pleasure, it was now time to move on. His time of leading God's people was over.

As I reflect upon this text, I can resonate a bit with what Moses must have been experiencing. In a span of about three years, I left Faith Lutheran in Pierre to serve first as a missionary/theological educator in Riga, Latvia, then as an associate regional director (ARD) of Eurasia, then as a regional director (RD) of Eurasia, and finally as the Executive Director of the Office of International Mission (OIM). As a missionary/theological educator, I taught seminary students from the Eurasia region at the regional seminary started by the LCMS. This seminary, called Luther Academy – Riga, is now fully accredited in the European Union and has a student body approaching 40. Aside from teaching, I also served on the academic council where I worked to develop the curriculum for the seminary. Additionally, I worked with our local partner church, the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Latvia, to plant an English-speaking congregation in Riga for tourists and expats. After a short time teaching at the seminary, I had served my purpose, and with the Lord's good pleasure, it was time to move on.

Next, I was appointed as ARD for the Eurasia region. In this role, I mainly worked directly with LCMS partner churches and in planting a Lutheran church in Israel. Currently, a small group of native Israelis are meeting for worship services conducted in Hebrew and soon there will be a native Israeli man who will be ordained as a Lutheran pastor to serve this group. After a very short time as ARD, I had served my purpose, and with the Lord's good pleasure, it was time to move on.

Following my six-month service as ARD, I was appointed as the Eurasia RD after my predecessor retired from the position. As the RD for Eurasia, I was responsible for LCMS mission and business activities from the birthplace of Lutheranism to the Holy Land to the heart of Islam in the Middle East to India, which is the LCMS's first international church plant, and finally, to the formerly atheistic Soviet Union. The Eurasia Region is OIM's largest region in land mass. It was a busy year of meeting with missionaries and church partners, developing strategic plans, approving budgets and regional expenses, and giving lectures on what LCMS international mission is all about. In addition, I worked to expand our Lutheran church plants beyond Israel to several other countries. But after a year as RD, I had served my purpose, and with the Lord's good pleasure, it was time to move on.

In January 2024, I accepted a call to serve as the Executive Director of OIM. In fact, as I now write this report, I am serving in St. Louis in this capacity. As the Executive Director of OIM, I oversee the staff in St. Louis, all LCMS international missionary care, the overall direction (mission and business) of international mission for the LCMS and OIM's interactions with LCMS church partners around the world among other things. Additionally, I represent OIM to the LCMS at large and the good work our OIM missionaries are doing internationally.

While my role over the last few years has dramatically changed, the mission our Lord has given has not changed. He continues to make disciples through Word and Sacrament as He has promised in Matthew 28. With the support of people and districts like South Dakota, OIM will continue to work toward Planting Lutheran Churches and connecting people to the places where our Savior has promised to be present. On a personal note, I cannot express enough my profound thankfulness to the South Dakota District for the support I received over the last few years. It has been a great privilege and honor to partner with you in the mission God has given us. Thank you for all you have done for me and the Lord be with you!

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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors of South Dakota District of the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod Sioux Falls, South Dakota

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of South Dakota District of the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod, a nonprofit organization (the Church), which comprise the statement of financial position as of January 14, 2024, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Church as of January 14, 2024, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Church and to meet our ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

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In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Church's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

1. DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Business

South Dakota District of the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod (the Church) is a non-profit organization responsible for uniting in a corporate body, the congregations, pastors, and teachers, who are members of the Church, situated or residing within the geographical boundaries of the South Dakota District; and for perpetuating the good work of disseminating the Gospel of Jesus Christ throughout the world.

Summary of Significant Accounting Principles

This summary of significant accounting policies of the Church is presented to assist in understanding the financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of the Church's management who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity. These accounting principles conform to generally accepted accounting principles and have been consistently applied in the preparation of financial statements.

Basis of Presentation

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB). The FASB requires the Church to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets: net assets without donor restrictions and net assets with donor restrictions.

Summarized Comparative Financial Information

The financial statements include certain prior year summarized comparative information in total but not by net asset class. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Church's audited financial statements for the year ended January 14, 2023, from which the summarized information was derived.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For financial statement reporting purposes, the Church includes all cash accounts not subject to withdrawal restrictions or penalties to be cash equivalents.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JANUARY 14, 2024

1. DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICES, continued

Lease Receivable

The Church is a lessor for a farmland lease. The Church recognizes a lease receivable and unearned lease revenue.

At the commencement of the lease, the Church initially measures the lease receivable at the present value of payments expected to be received during the lease term. Subsequently, the lease receivable is reduced by the principle portion of lease payments received. The unearned lease revenue is initially measured as the initial amount of the lease receivable, adjusted for lease payments received at or before the lease commencement date. The unearned lease revenue is recognized as revenue over the life of the lease term.

Key estimated and judgements how the Church determines (1) the discount rate it uses to discount the expected lease receipts to present value (2) lease term, and (3) lease receipts.

- The Church uses its estimated incremental borrowing rate as the discount rate for leases.
- The lease term includes the period of the lease. Lease receipts included in the measurement of the lease receivable are composed of fixed payments from the lessee.

The Church monitors changes in circumstances that would require a remeasurement of its lease and will remeasure the lease receivable and unearned lease revenue if certain changes occur that are expected to significantly affect the amount of the lease receivable.

Receivables and Credit Policies

Trade receivables are uncollateralized obligations due under normal trade terms requiring payment within 30 days from the invoice date. Loan receivables are stated at principal amounts and are collateralized if an asset is acquired with the loan proceeds. Personal loans do not require collateral. Any loan payment that is 30 or more days past due, the borrower will be charged a late payment fee for each month the payment is past due. The business office will send a delinquency notice to the borrower reporting the actions taken with a copy of notice to the Church president. Due to the uncertainty regarding collection of fees, delinquency fees are recognized as income when received.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JANUARY 14, 2024

1. DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

Investments

Investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are valued at their fair value in the statements of financial position. Realized and unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets in the statement of activities.

Property and Equipment

Property and Equipment consists of furniture and equipment stated at original cost or, if donated, at the fair market value of the asset at the date of gift if the useful life is more than a year. Expenditures for maintenance and repairs which do not improve or extend the life of an asset are charged to expense as incurred. Expenditures for maintenance which do improve or extend the life of an asset is charged to the property accounts.

Fair Value Measurements

The Church defined fair value as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. The Church required that valuation techniques maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JANUARY 14, 2024

1. DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

Fair Value Measurements, continued

The Church also adopted a fair value hierarchy, which prioritizes inputs into three broad levels:

Level 1: Inputs are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that can be accessed at the measurement date.

Level 2: Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset either directly or indirectly. Level 2 inputs include the following:

- Quoted prices for similar Assets or Liabilities in active markets:
- Quoted prices for similar Assets or Liabilities in markers that are not active:
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means (market-corroborated inputs).

If the asset or liability has a specified (or contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

Net Assets

Net assets, revenues, gains, and losses are classified based on the existence or absences of donor or grantor-imposed restriction. Accordingly, net assets and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

 Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions – Net assets available for use in general operation and not subject to donor (or certain grantor) restrictions.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JANUARY 14, 2024

Net Assets, continued

• Net Assets With Donor Restrictions – Net assets subject to donor or certain grantor-imposed restrictions. Some donor or grantor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor or grantor. Other donor or grantor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature where the donor stipulates that resourced be maintained in perpetuity. Gifts of long-lived assets or gifts of cash restricted of the acquisition of long-lived assets are recognized as revenue when the assets are placed in service. Donor or grantor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resourced was restricted has been fulfilled, or both.

Public Support and Revenue

The Church's public support and revenue is recognized when received or unconditionally pledged and is recorded as net assets with donor restrictions or net assets without donor restrictions depending on the existence and nature of any donor-imposed restrictions. Support and revenue that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions in the reporting period in which the support and revenue are recognized and are reclassified as net assets without donor restrictions upon satisfaction of the time or purpose restrictions.

Donated and Contributed Services

US GAAP requires recognition of professional services received if those services (a) create or enhance long-lived assets or (b) require specialized skills, are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation. Most of the services received by the Church do not meet these criteria. Contributions of tangible assets are recognized at fair value when received.

For the year ended January 14, 2024, no donated services were recognized as revenue. Board members and other volunteers have contributed a significant amount of time to the activities of the Church without compensation. The financial statements do not reflect the value of those contributed services since they do not meet the criteria for recognition.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JANUARY 14, 2024

1. DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

Donated and Contributed Services, continued

Pastors and lay people contribute a significant amount of time to the activities of the Church without compensation. However, the financial statements do not reflect the value of these contributed services because they do not meet the recognition criteria prescribed by generally accepted accounting policies.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates, and those differences could be material.

Functional Allocation Expenses

The costs of providing the various program activities and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. The statement of functional expenses presents the natural classification detail of expenses by function. Accordingly, certain costs, have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefitted.

Income Taxes

The Church is exempt from income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Form 990, Return of Organization Exempt from Income Taxes, is not required to be filed. In addition, the Church qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under 170(c)(2).

Implementation of New Accounting Standard and Restatement

During the year ended January 14, 2024, the Church implemented the provisions of FASB ASU 2016-02, Leases (Topic 842). ASU 2016-02 affects any entity that enters into a lease. The main difference between previous US GAAP and ASU 2016-02 is the recognition of an intangible lease asset and lease liability for the lessee and the recognition of a lease receivable and an unearned revenue for the lessor. There was no effect on the beginning net assets because of implementation of the standard.

3. DEPOSIT CREDIT RISK

The Church maintains cash and cash equivalents balances in several local financial institutions. The accounts at each institution are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) for up to \$250,000. At times throughout the year, the Church's balance may exceed the FDIC limit. As of January 14, 2024, the Church had no uninsured cash balance.

4. CONTRIBUTIONS RECEIVABLE AND DEFERRED GIFTS

Contributions receivable consist of unconditional promises to give that are due within one year and represent congregations commitments to the Church for the year ended January 14, 2024. The contributions receivable is recorded at net realizable value of \$706,437 as of January 14, 2024. Management considers all unconditional promises to give to be collectible and has determined that no allowance is necessary.

Irrevocable deferred gifts, including charitable remainder trusts, identify the Church as a beneficiary and are held in trust for the Church by the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod Foundation or other third-party trustee. Upon receiving notification of a deferred gift, the Church records the present value of the gift as a donor-imposed time or purpose restricted support. The present value of each gift is derived by applying a present value and actuarial formula to the current value. Increases or decreases in the present value of deferred gifts is recorded as changes in donor-imposed restricted net assets in the statements of activities and change in net assets. The value of these irrevocable deferred gifts is presented as gifts receivable on the statement of financial position.

Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod Transactions

Annually, the Church budgets an amount to support the Synod's budget based on the commitments from congregations and the Church's needs for mission and ministry work in South Dakota. The Church remits monthly payments to the Synod and then, at year-end, any amount over the year-end reserve set by the District's Board of Directors is forwarded to the Synod. The Church contributed a total of \$377,085 to the Synod for the year ended January 14, 2024. As of January 14, 2024, \$54,750 was included in accounts payable in the accompanying statements of financial position for this purpose.

Lutheran For Life

Lutherans For Life of South Dakota (LFLSD) is a state affiliate of the national organization of Lutherans For Life (LFL), organized in 1978 as a non-profit, pan-Lutheran mission. Our purpose is to give witness to, and equip Lutherans to give witness to the truth of the God-given sanctity of human life found only in God's word. Therefore our mission statement is: "Equipping Lutherans to be Gospel-motivated voices FOR LIFE". The message of LFL is the heart-changing truth of the Gospel of Jesus Christ: the unique, primary message being, "Here is what God has done that gives value and dignity to all human life." LFL desires to pattern its manner after the Apostle Paul and "speak the truth in love." LFL strives to give witness, from a Biblical perspective, to the Church and society on the value and dignity of all human life from the youngest to the oldest, the preborn to the elderly, from the weakest to the strongest.

Education on life issues is our primary purpose. We encourage attendance at National LFL Life Conferences as well as at programs we develop or sponsor on the state level. Articles have been published in the South Dakota insert of the Lutheran Witness.

An ongoing project has been our Youth Essay Contest on Life Issues for students in grades 6-8th grades and 9-12th grades. This contest is sponsored by the Council of Federation Presidents of which South Dakota is one Federation. Our state currently awards \$500 for first place in each category and \$250 for second place. The 2025 theme for the Essay Contest is **"Fearfully and Wonderfully Made"** Psalm 139:13-14. State winners are eligible for national competition and is a way for young people to use their creative skills to share God's word.

Our Annual Meeting is held in early January and has been a time of sharing what our members have been doing in their local areas. Also in January is traditionally Life Sunday although it can be observed at any time. LFL resources are available through Concordia Publishing House (CPH). The 2025 theme is Life Shines in Darkness.

The Annual State-wide Diaper Derby provides friendly competition between Mothers' Day and Fathers' Day to collect disposable diapers and supplies. They are then delivered to a crisis pregnancy center or shelter, etc. in local communities. This shows support for God's gift of life while helping moms and dads in need. It's fun to see who can collect the most diapers or packages of baby wipes.

In 2024 we helped spread the word that the State Constitutional Amendment G was not in keeping with the will of God and that we should urge God's people to vote No. We were to show kindness to the unborn still in their mothers' wombs and speak for those who couldn't speak for themselves.

The Witness of the Crosses continues to be a bold, eye-catching display which serves as a reminder of the babies whose lives are taken as a result of abortion each year. MAIN STREET LIVING

Jay Schaefer, Executive Director

Since January 6th, 2002, Main Street Living has been producing and airing liturgical LCMS worship services to homebound & nursing home individuals. The program is currently broadcast on ten television stations covering six states, eight LCMS districts, and over 1,100 LCMS congregations. We are a ministry that supports the work of pastors and their congregations as they reach those who are unable to attend in person worship.

Six unique regional programs are produced each week for South Dakota, North Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, Nebraska, and Wisconsin markets. It is estimated that the program is viewed weekly in about 25,000 households, with approximately 37,000 viewers. Local pastors proclaim the Good News of Jesus each week and invite the viewing audience to attend local services in the congregation they serve.

Jay Schaefer has been serving as Executive Director since 2021, and also edited and delivered services to television stations since 2016. The ministry recently contracted Joel Klein of Klein Media to record, edit, and deliver MN market episodes. This past summer a small group of editors have also been assisting with episode and hymn editing. In addition to this small team, a dedicated group of volunteers give their time and talents to process donations, schedule pastors for recordings, and facilitate recording days. This ministry could not exist without their generous help.

We have involved many more congregations and pastors in the ministry the past two years. The Nebraska market has included service recordings at Zion Lutheran (Kearney, NE) and St. Paul (Wisner, NE). The Minnesota market has added recordings at Prince of Peace (Baxter, MN) and Trinity Lutheran (Slayton, MN). We have also recorded choirs in Fargo, Sioux Falls and Black Hawk, SD; Sioux City, IA; Baxter, MN; and Eau Claire, WI. The video and audio of these choir recordings is available at MainStreetLiving.com for pastors to use when visiting members. Future expansion into central lowa and central Wisconsin is being discussed.

Since the pandemic donations, have been down and expenses have been up. While Main Street has a reserve fund from generous donors to help get us through, it will only last a few years. Congregational support makes a huge difference and can be as simple as informing members of the program. Other ways of support include praying for the ministry, including program information in church bulletin / newsletter, sharing broadcast times with those in need, and hosting a Main Street Living Sunday, in addition to financial support. We appreciate any support and/or ideas you may have.

Finally, we thank the pastors who proclaim God's Word on the program, keep this ministry in front of their congregations, and support us with their prayers. Main Street Living strives to provide production and administration, but it is the pastors who share the message that the world needs: forgiveness, life, hope, and salvation through Christ alone.

LUTERAN FAMILY SERVICE

Lutheran Family Service has partnered with the South Dakota District for several years bringing supportive adoption services, and mental health wellness services to individuals, church workers, and congregations. Unlike most of the mental health and adoption industry we whole-heartedly embrace your convention theme in being "not ashamed of the Gospel," for such is how we do our work. As a Recognized Service Organization of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, we strive to wrap the church and the love of Christ around those who are well and those who are struggling.

A primary focus of our work is to be a ready resource for church workers to help them deal with the stress of ministry and support them in the challenges of being the church in this, sometimes hostile, age. Our goal is to bring our ministry hearts into our work as highly educated and clinically trained therapists so that workers remain healthy in their mind and body, strong in their family relationships, and joyful in their serving.

Our support of church workers extends to care for those working within our Lutheran Schools, and those children and families they serve so well. At the Lutheran Educator's Conference in Sioux Falls this year, LFS counselors are leading topics on supporting students with mental health concerns and those with gender identity confusion. A new partnership is growing at Zion Lutheran School in Rapid City with an LFS counselor serving on site one afternoon per week.

Our century-plus ministry of caring for orphans continues in South Dakota and other states. We are a leading voice in the church in support of life through pregnancy counseling and adoption as primary avenues of extending the church's Biblically mandated work.

With the support and encouragement of the district in the past three years, we opened two offices in South Dakota (Sioux Falls and Deadwood) serving people in person at our offices and remotely via telehealth across the state. A third office, located within and hosted by the members at Divine Shepherd in Black Hawk, opened in October. Our South Dakota Lutheran Family Service staff includes three licensed mental health counselors, a grief specialist, and an adoption specialist. Our work includes groups, including those that support church worker spouses who have unique pressures to lovingly serving in their role. In addition, LFS pastors have filled pulpits across the district preaching the Gospel's "power of God that brings salvation," sharing ways this power is manifest through our caring mercy work.

We are thankful to God for all of you and the partnership we share to serve people in your District. Without your financial help, prayerful support, and district encouragement we would not have been able to serve so well and so many. We look forward to growing this partnership in the years ahead.

TO APPROVE AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE SOUTH DAKOTA DISTRICT OF THE LUTHERAN CHURCH – MISSOURI SYNOD CONCERNING THE EXECUTIVE OFFICERS OF THE DISTRICT

RATIONALE:

SUBJECT:

In 2022, during a time of vacancy in the Executive Secretary's position, the District's Board of Directors divided the former Executive Secretary's position into the District's two current Executive Officer positions: one is full-time (the Assistant to the President), and the other is part-time (the Education Executive). The ministry descriptions for these two current positions are included in the Administration section of the Convention Workbook. But, in summary, these officers assist the District President in the District's work in areas such as subsidized ministries, missions, stewardship, and education. The current Executive Office known as "Assistant to the President" replaces most of the duties of the former position in the District known as "Executive Secretary." The current Executive Office titled "Education Executive" is new. This office is responsible for providing resources, direction, and encouragement to the faculties and staffs of the LCMS schools in the South Dakota District. Having the knowledge and ability to assist in the calling of commissioned ministers and being well-versed in school legislation and regulations makes the Education Executive position in the District extremely valuable to our schools and their leaders.

This change in District administration, implemented by the Board of Directors, has led to the necessity of updating certain Bylaws of the District. The amendments being proposed here will allow for greater flexibility in staffing in the District. And they will allow for greater attention to areas calling for greater expertise, such as is being done with the current Education Executive position.

 WHEREAS, The Constitution of the Synod, Article XII (Districts of the Synod and Their Regulation), says in section 12, "The districts are independent in the administration of affairs which concern their district only, it being understood, however, that such administration shall always serve the interests of the Synod."; AND

SUBJECT: SOUTH DAKOTA DISTRICT TO RATIFY CONGREGATIONAL VOTE TO RESCIND 1976 DISTRICT CONVENTION RES. 3-03 REGARDING THE LUTHERAN WITNESS

RATIONALE: A 1976 District Convention resolution (3-03) required that "...each congregation should be billed for its share of the *Lutheran Witness* blanket subscription" and that "the blanket

3435 WHEREAS,

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 billed for its share of the *Lutheran Witness* blanket subscription" and that "the blanket subscription of our entire District be continued until a District Convention declines to continue it." The congregations of The South Dakota District have dutifully provided the *Lutheran Witness* to their households since that time. However, the cost for a subscription to the *Lutheran Witness* has risen dramatically in recent years, from \$11.25/subscription for 2022, to \$17.21/subscription for 2023, and close to \$20/subscription for 2024. The District's Board of Directors regard this increase as a financial challenge for many congregations. And they felt there was too much time until the next District Convention to change the policy by means of the usual method of conducting business: by convention action. Therefore, in their September 2023 meeting, the Board asked the District President to request a vote by the congregations of the District on whether to rescind the blanket subscription policy. This novel action of putting such a matter to a vote of congregations was based on Articles XII.2, XII.6, and XI.B.8 of the Synod's Constitution.

After District President Sailer put the vote to the congregations in the last quarter of 2023, seventy-five of the District's 106 congregations participated in the vote, with fifty-four congregations voting "yes" (to rescind 1976 Convention Res. 3-03) and with twenty-one congregations voting "no." The vote to rescind passed by a 72% majority.

In addition to that strong congregational vote to rescind the 1976 resolution, the Board of Directors believes that the adoption of this resolution will officially uphold the requirement of 1976 Convention Res. 3-03 that "the blanket subscription of our entire District be continued until a District Convention declines to continue it."

The 1976 South Dakota District Convention (Res. 3-03) had required that each District congregation should be billed for its share of the *Lutheran Witness* subscription; AND

The same resolution also required that this "blanket subscription" policy was to continue until "a District Convention declined to continue it": AND

SUBJECT: LCMS SOUTH DAKOTA DISTRICT TO CONTINUE TOGETHER IN MISSION (TIM)
SUPPORT AND TO ENCOURAGE CONGREGATIONAL INVOLVEMENT THEREIN

RATIONALE:

Since the 53rd Convention of The South Dakota District (1994), the District in Convention has adopted resolutions to partner with missionaries in a variety of mission fields. The initial District Convention resolution, Resolution 1-02 (1994), resolved that the financial gifts given to Together In Mission (TIM) by District congregations were to be "over and above" each congregation's regular offerings for Synod and District mission support. By District Convention action, those missionaries or projects receiving support from District congregations through Together In Mission since 1994 have been:

- Amy Kashenov serving in Kazakhstan (1994-2012)
- Global Seminary Initiative, seminaries in Tanzania, Africa and Novosibirsk, Russia (2013-14)
- Rev. Dr. Alan Ludwig, instructor at the Lutheran seminary in Novosibirsk, Russia (2015-2018)
- Rev. Dr. Daniel Jastram, serving in Southeast Asia and Rev. David Warner, serving in Spain (2018-2021)
- Rev. Dr. Daniel Jastram, Southeast Asia, and Rev. Dr. Corey Rajek, serving in Eurasia (2021-2025).

Then, late in 2023, the District President, at the Board of Directors' urging (and apart from District Convention action), put to the congregations the opportunity to support, via TIM, other missionaries from South Dakota sent to overseas mission fields in the past triennium. By a majority vote (72-3), the measure was adopted. At the time, Rev. Samuel Bobby was serving in Latvia, and Revs. Jordon Andreasen and Jonah Domenichelli, had received notice of calls to Romania and Germany, respectively. The two, subsequently, accepted the calls. All three – Missionaries Bobby, Andreasen, and Domenichelli – began receiving TIM support from South Dakota, toward the end of the past triennium. Meanwhile, Rev. Dr. Cory Rajek's TIM support ended after the District's 2023 fiscal year, because he became the Executive Director of the Office of International Mission of the LCMS.

For the coming triennium, convention delegates are asked to consider renewing the LCMS South Dakota District's commitment to support God's mission efforts abroad through the TIM program.

WHEREAS, God's mission (the *Missio Dei,* which belongs to Him and His love for the world) centers in the person and work of our Lord Jesus Christ (John 3:16-17); AND

WHEREAS, Just as God the Father sent (*apostello*) His Son Jesus into the world, Jesus sends all believers into the world to "seek and to save the lost" (John 20:21-23; Luke 19:10); AND

WHEREAS, The Lord continues to call His Church from among the nations around the world to work mutually in sending and receiving "laborers for the harvest" until that day when our Lord's mission is complete (Ephesians 4:1-7; Matthew 9:35-10:1); AND

WHEREAS, In Article 3.2, "Objectives" of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) Constitution, it states that the Synod shall "strengthen congregations and their members in giving bold witness by word and deed to the love and work of God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness into all the world;" AND

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TO CONTINUE THE MISSION AND MINISTRY COUNCIL FOR THE SUPPORT OF SUBJECT:

WORKERS AND MINISTRIES

BACKGROUND:

Over the years, the South Dakota District has utilized various committee structures for providing resources to the ministries and workers within the District. For example, the Service Area format was in place from 2006 through 2021 (cf. 2006 Res. 1-34); those Service Areas were identified as Outreach, Parish Services, and Young Adult and Youth.

While the Service Area structure provided many blessings in the 15 years of its existence, the types, sources, and delivery of ministry resources for church workers, congregations, and schools changed dramatically in this electronic age. Our workers often find it more convenient to turn to the internet for resources than to rely on and wait for resources produced by the District. Moreover, recruiting our already busy church workers for service on the committees of our District has grown more challenging.

Therefore, at the 2021 Convention of the District, the Service Area structure was "suspended for the 2022-2025 triennium," and in its place a "Mission and Ministry Council" comprised of representatives from every circuit in the District was authorized for the 2021-2025 triennium (cf. 2021 Res. 2-04). At this time, the Mission and Ministry Council has 10 members (8 laypeople, 1 commissioned minister, and 1 ordained minister) and 4 advisory members (the District President, 1st Vice-President, the Assistant to the President, and the District's Education Executive). The Council is chaired by one of the laypersons and is "supervised" by the Assistant to the President. Members are appointed by the District President and 1st Vice-President.

Since it began operating in December of 2022, the Mission and Ministry Council has helped to organize the P.A.S.S. It On! congregational resource workshops in November 2023 and November 2024, and a Men's Retreat, held in December 2023, in Brookings, and another held in the Black Hills, the summer of 2024.

- WHEREAS. In the past triennium, the Mission and Ministry Council structure of providing support and ministry resources has resulted in providing a variety of helpful events that have brought together church workers and church members for fellowship, education, and equipping for service; AND
- 34 WHEREAS, The involvement and interaction of laypersons and church workers on the Council has been 35 particularly dynamic, yielding fresh ideas for Christian growth and service; AND
 - WHEREAS, Per Resolution 2-04 2021, the Mission and Ministry Council and Board of Directors have been charged to bring a plan for ongoing structure to provide support and ministry resources, the Board of Directors of the LCMS South Dakota District recommends continuing the Mission and Ministry Council concept for the 2025-2028 triennium;

SUBJECT: TO CONTINUE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE SOUTH DAKOTA DISTRICT (LCMS)

AND LUTHERAN FAMILY SERVICE (IOWA)

HISTORY:

In 2018, Lutheran Family Service of Iowa (LFS) approached the Board of Directors of the South Dakota District about the possibility of working cooperatively in South Dakota. LFS is a Recognized Service Organization of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod. They are owned by Missouri Synod congregations in Iowa and receive support from the Iowa East and West Districts of the LCMS. They do not receive funding from any governmental organization and so are free to practice our common Christian faith.

The District entered into an agreement with LFS in December 2019 for LFS (1) to be available to consult with pastors and other church workers in the counseling work of the parish, (2) to work with church workers and their families about issues that those individuals and families are struggling with through telehealth counseling with counselors from LFS in lowa, and (3) to train people in South Dakota to help others in various areas such as Elder Care, Dementia, Addictions, and Marriage challenges.

The 2021 South Dakota District Convention resolved "to expand this ministry by asking God to open our eyes to whatever other good works "which God has prepared in advance, that we should walk in them" (Ephesians 2:10), and to "commit to LFS \$75,000 for 2022, \$75,000 for 2023, and \$50,000 for 2024 to fund start-up costs and the operation of this ministry". Half of the money was to come "from gifts and bequests that the District has received over the years and the other half would come from the congregations of the South Dakota District as 'an over and above' giving similar to our present 'Together in Mission (TIM)' gifts."

In 2022 the District received \$54,192 for LFS from the congregations of the District, 2023-\$53,301, 2024 ______. The goal for 2025 would be \$50,000. It will take a concerted effort on the part of all the congregations of the District to reach this goal.

This commitment would be similar to the one the District makes with the Synod concerning TIM. For TIM the District pledges \$40,000 a year and would take that amount out of District funds if the money doesn't come in from congregations. Every year the congregations have provided significantly more than that: 2022-\$71,759, 2023-\$75,849, 2024- . Every dollar received for TIM is sent on to the Synod. In other words, we have not had to take any money from District funds.

The pledge for LFS would be the same amount (\$40,000) with the same arrangement: every dollar received would be sent on to LFS and if we don't receive enough for the full pledge the money will be taken from District funds.

WHEREAS: The South Dakota District (LCMS) has been in partnership with Lutheran Family Service

(lowa) since 2019. Lutheran Family Service has provided counseling, adoption and other services to individuals, church workers and their families, as well as congregations. The

SD District has provided financial and other support to LFS, AND

WHEREAS: This arrangement has grown over the years to include counseling offices on both sides of

South Dakota as well as tele-health which is accessible throughout the State, AND

WHEREAS: The need for these services continues to grow exponentially, THEREFORE BE IT

OFFICERS OF THE DISTRICT

RATIONALE:

SUBJECT:

In 2022, during a time of vacancy in the Executive Secretary's position, the District's Board of Directors divided the former Executive Secretary's position into the District's two current Executive Officer positions: one is full-time (the Assistant to the President), and the other is part-time (the Education Executive). The ministry descriptions for these two current positions are included in the Administration section of the Convention Workbook. But, in summary, these officers assist the District President in the District's work in areas such as subsidized ministries, missions, stewardship, and education. The current Executive Office known as "Assistant to the President" replaces most of the duties of the former position in the District known as "Executive Secretary." The current Executive Office titled "Education Executive" is new. This office is responsible for providing resources, direction, and encouragement to the faculties and staffs of the LCMS schools in the South Dakota District. Having the knowledge and ability to assist in the calling of commissioned ministers and being well-versed in school legislation and regulations makes the Education Executive position in the District extremely valuable to our schools and their leaders.

This change in District administration, implemented by the Board of Directors, has led to the necessity of updating certain Bylaws of the District. The amendments being proposed here will allow for greater flexibility in staffing in the District. And they will allow for greater attention to areas calling for greater expertise, such as is being done with the current Education Executive position.

 WHEREAS, The Constitution of the Synod, Article XII (Districts of the Synod and Their Regulation), says in section 12, "The districts are independent in the administration of affairs which concern their district only, it being understood, however, that such administration shall always serve the interests of the Synod."; AND

WHEREAS, The District's Board of Directors has found it beneficial to serve the interests of the Synod in this place by employing up to two Executive Officers to assist the District President in his work, especially in the areas of subsidized ministries, missions, and education; AND

WHEREAS.

Assigning an Executive Officer the added responsibility of ensuring that "Biblical principles of stewardship are promoted throughout the District," fulfills Synod Bylaw 4.6.1, which says that "each district shall elect or appoint a committee, board, or individual responsible for stewardship."; THEREFORE BE IT

That the Bylaws of The South Dakota District of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod be amended and adopted as follows, contingent on approval by the Synod's Commission on Constitutional Matters:

Simple amendments, such as changing "layman" 10 to "layperson," were made to the Bylaws in order to use language that makes this more 11 clear. But in the Election Procedure section of the Bylaws, it was discovered that two 12 references to this layman/layperson or laymen/laypeople distinction were missed by the 13 last convention. The adoption of this resolution will correct those errors. 14 15 Additionally, at the last Synod Convention (2023), clarity was given to election procedures 16 for District offices, including for elections other than for President, Vice-Presidents, and 17 Circuit Visitors (2023 Synod Res. 9-02, Section H). That proposed clarification is found in 18 the 5.09 section of the District's Bylaws (found on the second page of this resolution). 19 20 It is the desire and the obligation of The South Dakota District of The Lutheran Church— WHEREAS, 21 Missouri Synod to honor LC-MS convention resolutions and the resulting changes to the 22 Handbook of the Synod, including those that pertain to the governing documents of LCMS 23 entities (LCMS Bylaw 1.3.6, 2nd Restated Articles of Incorporation of The South Dakota 24 District, Article III.C); AND 25 26 Where errors are discovered, they should be corrected, since we are to conduct ourselves WHEREAS, 27 "decently and in order" (I Cor. 14:40); THEREFORE BE IT 28 29 RESOLVED: That the Bylaws of The South Dakota District of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod be 30 amended and adopted as follows, contingent on approval by the Synod's Commission on 31 Constitutional Matters: 32 33 [PRESENT/PROPOSED WORDING] 34 35 [BRACKETS ARE USED FOR EXPLANATIONS ONLY; THIS MATERIAL IS NOT PART OF THE 36 AMENDMENTS.] 37 38 39 V. RATIONALE:

SUBJECT: SOUTH DAKOTA DISTRICT TO RATIFY CONGREGATIONAL VOTE TO RESCIND 1976 DISTRICT CONVENTION RES. 3-03 REGARDING THE LUTHERAN WITNESS

A 1976 District Convention resolution (3-03) required that "...each congregation should be billed for its share of the *Lutheran Witness* blanket subscription" and that "the blanket subscription of our entire District be continued until a District Convention declines to continue it." The congregations of The South Dakota District have dutifully provided the *Lutheran Witness* to their households since that time. However, the cost for a subscription to the *Lutheran Witness* has risen dramatically in recent years, from \$11.25/subscription for 2022, to \$17.21/subscription for 2023, and close to \$20/subscription for 2024. The District's Board of Directors regard this increase as a financial challenge for many congregations. And they felt there was too much time until the next District Convention to change the policy by means of the usual method of conducting business: by convention action. Therefore, in their September 2023 meeting, the Board asked the District President to request a vote by the congregations of the District on whether to rescind the blanket subscription policy. This novel action of putting such a matter to a vote of congregations was based on Articles XII.2, XII.6, and XI.B.8 of the Synod's Constitution.

After District President Sailer put the vote to the congregations in the last quarter of 2023, seventy-five of the District's one hundred and six congregations participated in the vote, with fifty-four congregations voting "yes" (to rescind 1976 Convention Res. 3-03) and with twenty-one congregations voting "no." The vote to rescind passed by a seventy two % majority.

In addition to that strong congregational vote to rescind the 1976 resolution, the Board of Directors believes that the adoption of this resolution will officially uphold the requirement of 1976 Convention Res. 3-03 that "the blanket subscription of our entire District be continued until a District Convention declines to continue it."

- **WHEREAS**, The 1976 South Dakota District Convention (Res. 3-03) had required that each District congregation should be billed for its share of the *Lutheran Witness* subscription; AND
- **WHEREAS**, The same resolution also required that this "blanket subscription" policy was to continue until "a District Convention declined to continue it"; AND
- **WHEREAS**, A congregational vote in 2023, put forward by the District President between District conventions (per Synod Constitution Articles XI and XII), determined that the policy should be rescinded, having passed by a 72% majority; THEREFORE BE IT
 - **RESOLVED**: That the South Dakota District in convention ratify the congregational vote of 2023 to rescind the blanket subscription, thus honoring the decline-to-continue clause of 1976 District Convention Res. 3-03; AND BE IT FURTHER
- **RESOLVED**: That the congregations of the District encourage their members to subscribe on their own to the *Lutheran Witness*, the "official periodical of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod," or to otherwise make the *Lutheran Witness* available to their members; AND BE IT FINALLY
 - **RESOLVED**: That the congregations of the District be thanked and commended for having provided the *Lutheran Witness* to their member households for nearly fifty years.

LCMS SOUTH DAKOTA DISTRICT TO CONTINUE TOGETHER IN MISSION (TIM) SUPPORT AND TO ENCOURAGE CONGREGATIONAL INVOLVEMENT THEREIN

RATIONALE:

SUBJECT:

 Since the 53rd Convention of The South Dakota District (1994), the District in Convention has adopted resolutions to partner with missionaries in a variety of mission fields. The initial District Convention resolution, Resolution 1-02 (1994), resolved that the financial gifts given to Together In Mission (TIM) by District congregations were to be "over and above" each congregation's regular offerings for Synod and District mission support. By District Convention action, those missionaries or projects receiving support from District congregations through Together In Mission since 1994 have been:

- Amy Kashenov serving in Kazakhstan (1994-2012)
- Global Seminary Initiative, seminaries in Tanzania, Africa and Novosibirsk, Russia (2013-14)
- Rev. Dr. Alan Ludwig, instructor at the Lutheran seminary in Novosibirsk, Russia (2015-2018)
- Rev. Dr. Daniel Jastram, serving in Southeast Asia and Rev. David Warner, serving in Spain (2018-2021)
- Rev. Dr. Daniel Jastram, Southeast Asia, and Rev. Dr. Corey Rajek, serving in Eurasia (2021-2025).

Then, late in 2023, the District President, at the Board of Directors' urging (and apart from District Convention action), put to the congregations the opportunity to support, via TIM, other missionaries from South Dakota sent to overseas mission fields in the past triennium. By a majority vote (72-3), the measure was adopted. At the time, Rev. Samuel Bobby was serving in Latvia, and Revs. Jordon Andreasen and Jonah Domenichelli, had received notice of calls to Romania and Germany, respectively. The two, subsequently, accepted the calls. All three – Missionaries Bobby, Andreasen, and Domenichelli – began receiving TIM support from South Dakota, toward the end of the past triennium. Meanwhile, Rev. Dr. Cory Rajek's TIM support ended after the District's 2023 fiscal year, because he became the Executive Director of the Office of International Mission of the LCMS.

For the coming triennium, convention delegates are asked to consider renewing the LCMS South Dakota District's commitment to support God's mission efforts abroad through the TIM program.

God's mission (the *Missio Dei*, which belongs to Him and His love for the world) centers in the person and work of our Lord Jesus Christ (John 3:16-17); AND

Just as God the Father sent (*apostello*) His Son Jesus into the world, Jesus sends all believers into the world to "seek and to save the lost" (John 20:21-23; Luke 19:10); AND

The Lord continues to call His Church from among the nations around the world to work mutually in sending and receiving "laborers for the harvest" until that day when our Lord's mission is complete (Ephesians 4:1-7; Matthew 9:35-10:1); AND

In Article 3.2, "Objectives" of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) Constitution, it states that the Synod shall "strengthen congregations and their members in giving bold witness by word and deed to the love and work of God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness into all the world;" AND

Samuel Bobby (Latvia), and Rev. Jonah Domenichelli (Germany), as the recipients of the District's TIM offerings, in equal measure, for the 2025-2028 triennium; AND BE IT FURTHER

That should other missionaries from South Dakota be called to overseas LCMS missionary service in the next triennium, they, too, will receive an equal share of the District's TIM support for the balance of the triennium; AND BE IT FURTHER

That should any of these missionaries retire from active missionary service or return from the mission field before 2028, the balance of the TIM offerings will go in equal measure to the missionaries still remaining in the field. If all of these workers should retire or return from the mission field before our next convention, the South Dakota District's Board of Directors will determine which missionary or missionaries will receive our congregations' TIM offerings for the remainder of the triennium; AND BE IT FURTHER

That every congregation of The South Dakota District, regardless of size, be encouraged to partner with the other District congregations by 1) remembering the work of missionaries Jastram, Bobby, Andreasen, and Domenichelli in their corporate and individual prayers and 2) by providing an annual commitment to TIM over and above their regular support of Synod and District missions; AND BE IT FINALLY

That the District President and the Assistant to the President work with the Office of International Mission of the LCMS to arrange for possible FOROs (Spanish for *forum*) in the Eurasia mission field, in the coming triennium, to give members of South Dakota District congregations the on-site opportunity to learn and serve and to encourage our missionaries and their families (cf. 2023 Synod Res. 2-07A).

TO CONTINUE THE MISSION AND MINISTRY COUNCIL FOR THE SUPPORT OF

WORKERS AND MINISTRIES

BACKGROUND:

Over the years, the South Dakota District has utilized various committee structures for providing resources to the ministries and workers within the District. For example, the Service Area format was in place from 2006 through 2021 (cf. 2006 Res. 1-34); those Service Areas were identified as Outreach, Parish Services, and Young Adult and Youth.

While the Service Area structure provided many blessings in the 15 years of its existence, the types, sources, and delivery of ministry resources for church workers, congregations, and schools changed dramatically in this electronic age. Our workers often find it more convenient to turn to the internet for resources than to rely on and wait for resources produced by the District. Moreover, recruiting our already busy church workers for service on the committees of our District has grown more challenging.

Therefore, at the 2021 Convention of the District, the Service Area structure was "suspended for the 2022-2025 triennium," and in its place a "Mission and Ministry Council" comprised of representatives from every circuit in the District was authorized for the 2021-2025 triennium (cf. 2021 Res. 2-04). At this time, the Mission and Ministry Council has 10 members (8 laypeople, 1 commissioned minister, and 1 ordained minister) and 4 advisory members (the District President, 1st Vice-President, the Assistant to the President, and the District's Education Executive). The Council is chaired by one of the laypersons and is "supervised" by the Assistant to the President. Members are appointed by the District President and 1st Vice-President.

Since it began operating in December of 2022, the Mission and Ministry Council has helped to organize the P.A.S.S. It On! congregational resource workshops in November 2023 and November 2024, and a Men's Retreat, held in December 2023, in Brookings, and another held in the Black Hills, the summer of 2024.

WHEREAS,

In the past triennium, the Mission and Ministry Council structure of providing support and ministry resources has resulted in providing a variety of helpful events that have brought together church workers and church members for fellowship, education, and equipping for service; AND

34 WHEREAS,

The involvement and interaction of laypersons and church workers on the Council has been particularly dynamic, yielding fresh ideas for Christian growth and service; AND

36 WHEREAS,37

Per Resolution 2-04 (2021), the Mission and Ministry Council and Board of Directors have been charged to bring a plan for ongoing structure to provide support and ministry resources, the Board of Directors of the LCMS South Dakota District recommends continuing the Mission and Ministry Council concept; THEREFORE BE IT

SUBJECT: TO CONTINUE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE SOUTH DAKOTA DISTRICT (LCMS)

AND LUTHERAN FAMILY SERVICE (IOWA)

HISTORY:

In 2018, Lutheran Family Service of Iowa (LFS) approached the Board of Directors of the South Dakota District about the possibility of working cooperatively in South Dakota. LFS is a Recognized Service Organization of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod. They are owned by Missouri Synod congregations in Iowa and receive support from the Iowa East and West Districts of the LCMS. They do not receive funding from any governmental organization and so are free to practice our common Christian faith.

The District entered into an agreement with LFS in December 2019 for LFS (1) to be available to consult with pastors and other church workers in the counseling work of the parish, (2) to work with church workers and their families about issues that those individuals and families are struggling with through telehealth counseling with counselors from LFS in lowa, and (3) to train people in South Dakota to help others in various areas such as Elder Care, Dementia, Addictions, and Marriage challenges.

The 2021 South Dakota District Convention resolved "to expand this ministry by asking God to open our eyes to whatever other good works "which God has prepared in advance, that we should walk in them" (Ephesians 2:10), and to "commit to LFS \$75,000 for 2022, \$75,000 for 2023, and \$50,000 for 2024 to fund start-up costs and the operation of this ministry". Half of the money was to come "from gifts and bequests that the District has received over the years and the other half would come from the congregations of the South Dakota District as 'an over and above' giving similar to our present 'Together in Mission (TIM)' gifts."

In 2022 the District received \$54,192 for LFS from the congregations of the District, 2023-. The goal for 2025 would be \$50,000. It will take a concerted effort on the part of all the congregations of the District to reach this goal.

This commitment to LFS would be similar to the one the District makes with the Synod concerning TIM. For TIM the District pledges \$40,000 a year and would take that amount out of District funds if the money doesn't come in from congregations. Every year the congregations have provided significantly more than that: 2022-\$71,759, 2023-\$75,849, 2024- . Every dollar received for TIM is sent on to the Synod. In other words, we have not had to take any money from District funds.

The pledge for LFS would be the same amount (\$40,000 annually) with the same arrangement: every dollar received would be sent on to LFS and if we don't receive enough for the full pledge the money will be taken from District funds.

WHEREAS: The South Dakota District (LCMS) has been in partnership with Lutheran Family Service

> (lowa) since 2019. Lutheran Family Service has provided counseling, adoption and other services to individuals, church workers and their families, as well as congregations. The SD District has provided financial and other support to LFS, AND

WHEREAS: This arrangement has grown over the years to include counseling offices on both sides of South Dakota as well as tele-health which is accessible throughout the State, AND

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DISTRICT PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT NOMINATIONS

Nominations for the 2025 South Dakota District Convention election of the District President and District Vice Presidents closed on Monday, December 16, 2024. It was allowed that any nominations post-marked by December 16 would be included in the nomination tally. In accord with Bylaw 5.05.d.4, South Dakota District Secretary Reverend Dr. Thomas Brown and the chairman of the nominating committee, Reverend Dan Grimmer, met in Murdo on Friday, December 20, to tabulate the nominations. Care was given to be generous to minor errors made on the nomination forms. In the case where multiple names were given, only the first was considered valid. In a case where copies of the ballot were made and multiple ballots sent in, the sender was asked which one they wanted to count for the nomination. Only one congregation's nominations were deemed entirely illegal as the name given was not eligible for election because the person was not on the ordained roster of the Synod (Bylaw 5.05.a.1 and 5.05.d.1). An attempt was made to contact that congregation but having received no response, those two ballots were not included in the tabulation.

Comments

All five men are qualified under South Dakota District By-Law 5.05.a.1. However, District Bylaw 5.05.a.4 requires that the names of those men with at least five nominating votes for the Office of President shall be reported to the Convention, and District By-Law 5.05.b.1 says that the "three ordained ministers receiving the highest number of votes in the nominating ballots of the congregations" shall be the candidates to be considered. As only two men received the required five nominations, an exception will be needed to allow the next highest willing nominee to be on the ballot. Reverends Aker and Rynearson have both declined the nominations. Reverends Kumm, Sturzenbecher, and Winckler have accepted their nominations. Therefore, after the Convention allows an exception, and before any amendments to the slate of candidates from the floor (5.05.b.6), the slate of candidates for District President shall be:

Although the District Bylaws do not require the tabulation of the nominations for District President to be a shared duty between the Secretary of the District and the Chair of the Nominating Committee, Reverends Brown and Grimmer jointly tabulated the nominations for both the District President and the Vice Presidents.

QUESTIONS FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE OFFICE OF DISTRICT PRESIDENT

1. Describe your commitment to the doctrine and practice of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

I am 100% committed to the Holy Scriptures, and Lutheran Confessions, found in the Book of Concord, that I have sworn to at my ordination and each installation where I have served. This commitment standing on the Scriptures and Confessions are where the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod stands and separates us from others who do not take the sole source and foundation of our faith seriously. God help us all to remain steadfast in the one true faith.

2. What challenges and opportunities do you see facing our South Dakota District?

The Church at large faces many challenges locally, district, synod, nationally, and globally. The culture is not welcoming to our faith nor our morality. Thus, we find ourselves at odds with the culture and the world. Life issues, sexuality issues, and so many more will not be going away soon, and need to be dealt with. Likewise, our decreasing membership in churches across the nation is causing many to be "un-sustainable," and forcing many to close. How do we continue to serve the members of those churches? How do we ensure those sheep continue to be fed with the nourishment of Word and Sacraments? I believe this is one of the biggest challenges the SD District faces. We need more pastors, yet we have the opportunity to help some of our retired brothers to find purpose in retirement of helping congregations as I have described above. Part-time ministry to these struggling congregations can be a boon and blessing to many. We must look for every opportunity to continue to provide Word and Sacrament ministry to all within the Church.

3. What is your vision for The South Dakota District?

The South Dakota District is strong, and I certainly would like to see it remain strong and even grow stronger. In my opinion, we can do that merely by being who we have sworn to be, faithful preachers and teacher of the one true faith, and holding to who we are as confessional Lutheran Christians. We must continue to reach out to those who are unchurched or lapsed. Statistics show us that growth doesn't come about through programs, but the vast majority of growth comes when people have been invited by a member. We must encourage our members to reach out, invite, share, and most of all be "In the Word" (as Sainted LCMS President Al Barry loved to say). We have much to do and we must be ready to work.

4. How do you see the role of District President?

The District President is elected by the District. He is not a Synod officer. His work is in the District and that should be his focus. The Council of Presidents (COP) is a group made up of all 35 District Presidents, the 6 Vice-Presidents of Synod and the President of Synod. They meet 4 times a year, plus there are meetings of regional District Presidents. It is my opinion that these meetings take the District President from his District too often and for too long. How so? Committees, programs, etc. that the COP creates require time and effort that takes away from his District duties. I am not saying the COP should be eliminated. I am saying they are NOT officers of Synod, so there does not need to be so many meetings outside the realm of the District.

For many in the District, the District President is only known as the one who meets with them when their current pastor leaves, gets them call lists when they need a pastor, or comes to install/ordain a pastor when one accepts their call. There is much more this man is elected to do. He is the Ecclesiastical Supervisor of all rostered church workers, which can mean disciplinary and other human resource type actions and responsibilities. He also is charged with getting to know each congregation in his district so he may be of service to them in any condition they may be in. He serves as the administrator of the District, serves on the District Board of Directors, deals with budgeting, assisted by the Board of Directors, and Circuit Visitors. He must report his administration to the President of Synod, interview men from his district who apply to seminary, and deal with legal issues in congregations, and schools.

The District President has his finger on the pulse of a lot of different things, but I do think he needs to be connected with a congregation. With no malice toward any current or past District President in this district or others, but many District Presidents have accepted Divine Calls as part-time assistants at a congregation to remain connected to the parish life. I think this is extremely important. The District President is an overseer, a Bishop, if you will, and needs to be connected with a parish to see how the issues of the culture, the community, and the world are affecting his people, pastors, and church workers. The value of such is beyond measuring. The assistance of his Vice-Presidents, and Circuit Visitors, and judicious delegation of duties and oversight can allow this to happen and be successful.

5. How would you assist the congregations and church workers of the District to remain theologically and confessionally strong?

I personally prefer to lead by example. Show the congregations, church workers, and above all, pastors, what it means to be theologically and confessionally strong through preaching, teaching, encouraging, mentoring, loving, and caring of individuals, groups, congregations, et.al. Like St. Paul writes, "For I determined not to know anything among you, save Jesus Christ, and him crucified." (2 Corinthians 2:2) There is the core. Let us find ourselves gathered at the cross where our sins have been forgiven, our faith is strengthened, and the sure and certain hope of resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come is found. Grant it Lord, for Jesus' sake. Amen.

QUESTIONS FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE OFFICE OF DISTRICT PRESIDENT

Describe your commitment to the doctrine and practice of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

"Your Word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path." Psalm 119:105. I believe and freely confess that God's Word is true (John 17:17) and the only hope for sinners. It is the Word of God that is the rule and norm that guides and directs the doctrine and practice of our Synod. I believe that the three Creeds, the Unaltered Augsburg Confession, the Apology of the Augsburg Confession, the Smalcald Articles, the Large and Small Catechism, and the Formula of Concord are right expositions of doctrine of God's Word. It is the Word of God

only that accomplishes and succeeds in seeking and saving the lost (Isaiah 55:11 Luke 19:10). Our Synod follows the example of the first century church talking and walking together in the unity of Scriptures to bring the freedom and hope of Christ into the lives of His people. In a time when truth is viewed as subjective, and people will "accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths." (2nd Timothy 4:3-4) it is even more important that we walk together in God's Word as a Synod and the Lutheran Confessions so that our witness to His truth is clear.

2. What challenges and opportunities do you see facing our South Dakota District?

The opportunities to tell the good news and offer hope are endless. Thanks be to God that He has put us here in this beloved South Dakota District to love Him and love and serve our neighbor.

God has blessed us with unending opportunities to share the good news of Jesus and offer hope and peace to our neighbors. God has blessed us with faithful Pastors, DCE's and Deaconesses, as well as talented and faithful lay men and women to bring hope to the hurting and forgiveness to the forsaken. God has blessed us with faithful Lutheran daycares, early childhood centers, elementary and high schools, and faithful Lutheran school teachers and administrators that teach and catechize. The very foundations of faith are taught in our Lutheran early childhood centers, preschools, and daycares. Let's not forget the countless, faithful parents and laypeople that shine brightly with the light of Christ as their hope, as they go to work! As our communities become more diverse, ethnic ministry opportunities abound. Even in our smaller communities there are opportunities to reach out with Bible studies that ground us in hope and forgiveness and build relationships. "But in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect" (1st Peter 3:15).

We do have challenges before us. Our post-Christian world is less and less tolerant of the truth of Jesus Christ. Many times what people think they know about Christianity is incorrect, allowing them to remain in their sin or live with a false confidence of their salvation. Church worker health and retention of workers must be guarded. With less church workers available we must work harder to make sure our current workers are and remain physically, emotionally, and spiritually healthy. Along that line the growing number of vacancies puts more stress on the pastors that are serving them. Viability of our congregations becomes increasingly more challenging with older and smaller groups worshiping. As many of our rural churches become smaller, the financial implications impact budgets from the congregation up to the District and Synod. Church worker education debt adds another level of stress in the church worker's life. Yes, we have significant challenges before us, but we are not without hope! "Not only that, but we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us" (Romans 5:3-4).

3. What is your vision for The South Dakota District?

Faithfulness to God's Word and His promises to us. The vision for a District President cannot be his own, lest pride and arrogance overtake him. The vision for the South Dakota District is given to us through God's Word. "Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful" (Hebrews 10:23).

Our Good Shepherd came to seek and save the lost and bring comfort and hope to the hopeless. We continue faithfully preaching and teaching the eternal and unchanging hope we have through Christ Jesus. We celebrate when one receives faith in Holy Baptism or

receives Absolution through the blood of Christ. We are strengthened when the very body and blood of Jesus are placed in our hands and on our lips.

Guided by God's great commission, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you" (Matthew 29:19-20), we continue looking for new opportunities to meet people with the promises of Christ. A cross-focused vision for the District is one that encourages all people to receive God's gifts of Word and Sacrament regularly, and continually looks for ways to serve and love our neighbors. Because the world in which we live is ever changing we must be intentional and creative in our reach into new areas with this Gospel hope. I envision more church plants or other creative ways, such as preaching stations, hub ministry or something like circuit riders of the 19th century. I pray that we will build Gospel-centered relationships in the many ethnic groups that are growing in South Dakota. I pray that we will support our pastors with resources that will help them stay healthy physically as well as emotionally.

4. How do you see the role of District President?

The District President is to be a pastor to the pastors and their families, encouraging and strengthening them and all the church workers in the District. The work of the Church is done well when our workers are healthy. The District President is to be a servant leader who supports and equips the ongoing ministry of the church or school. His role is supportive in providing information, counsel, and resources so the work of the church can move forward with the message of Christ. His role is to encourage congregations that struggle against the pressures of the world seeking to reform the church into its own image. His role holds pastors and congregations accountable to the Word of God and the Confessions for purity of doctrine and unity of the believers (Romans 16:17 Ephesians 4:14). His role is reconciler, always working to keep communication open and honest. His role is liaison between Synod and congregation.

5. How would you assist the congregations and church workers of the District to remain theologically and confessionally strong?

We remain fully committed to God's Word and the Confessions by careful and ongoing study of God's Word. I would encourage a faithful confession, in doctrine and practice, for the church workers through the teaching at Winkels and pastors and all workers conferences. Continuing education such as Doxology continues to strengthen our confession. Sabbaticals can be a useful tool for intentional focused study, strengthening faith and practice.

Strengthening and assisting congregations is primarily done through constant study of God's word, hearing it preached and receiving the Lord's Supper. The District President as well as the District staff will also be able to suggest Synod resources that may strengthen faithfulness.

Where we stand united, we give thanks to God. On those rare occasions when those called to lead fail in this, the goal is repentance, reconciliation, and restoration. This will require personal contact, admonition, and prayer. While the District President does play a role in the Synod at large, it is the President's first duty to ensure the workers under his supervision are cared for, guided, and shaped for faithful service to the Lord Jesus Christ (Revelation 2:10).

QUESTIONS FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE OFFICE OF DISTRICT PRESIDENT

Describe your commitment to the doctrine and practice of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

The heart of our doctrine and practice is the love God has made known to His world in Jesus Christ our Lord. In the cross God has made His commitment to rescue you and me, sparing nothing, even giving up his own Son, according to His holy, inspired, inerrant, and infallible Word. And now, made alive in Christ, we are called to live in His grace and make His ways known, confidently and faithfully moving ahead, all the while knowing we can never exhaust His gifts. This is simple, straightforward Gospel drew me to the Lutheran confession 25 years ago, to the seminary 17 years ago, and ordination 13 years ago, where I vowed to remain constant in this truth to the best of my ability. I simply desire to hear the call of God and serve Him faithfully with the gifts He's given in the time He allows. I pray that God keep me faithful and, where I have erred, bring me to repentance and forgive me.

2. What challenges and opportunities do you see facing our South Dakota District? The challenges of a "Post-Christian" America and world are well-documented and obvious to anyone who has spent any time considering where we now stand. Declines are discouraging and those who remain are exhausted by trying to do more with less. Anxiety and fatigue drown joy and sap enthusiasm that should come naturally to us who have been given the best reason for joy and enthusiasm.

The anxiety and fatigue can come from focusing on what is lacking. But consider, for a moment, what we do have:

- The truth of Gospel.
- The people who remain.
- The opportunity of a growing mission field in all communities as the "unchurched" increase.

This opportunity is great, but what do about it is not as clear and well-defined. How can those people who remain bring the truth to those who need to hear? This is the big opportunity and the big question before us as we consider our place in God's mission.

3. What is your vision for The South Dakota District?

The vision ought not be anything different than God's vision: building relationships, discipleship, baptizing, and teaching. It can seem so big and grand, but I would encourage people to think simple and small:

- Commit to being in the word and worship. Keep coming back and participate.
- Care for each other within the family of faith.
- Care and outreach to those who have been less involved or walked away.
- Witness to the "unchurched" and "unbelievers" with word and deed.

This good work mostly happens at the level of the congregation, focusing day-by-day, week-by-week, and month-by-month on small, simple, incremental, and realistic steps toward serving the communities where God has placed us with the gifts He's given us. As District, it is our place to support the congregation, workers and laity, as they build communities where this happens. The District can and should be a resource for opportunities to support and equip her people as they work together in her mission, with

this question at the heart of our thinking, speaking and doing: "How, in the love of Christ, will I serve my neighbor?"

4. How do you see the role of District President?

I am grateful for the opportunity to have learned from President Sailer and have a great fondness for one of his favorite descriptions of the role of District Officials as "Advisors to the Queen." The "Queen," of course, is the local church, God's own precious, blood-bought bride. We are blessed to come alongside to offer help and support as the "Queen" understands and embraces her place in the Kingdom.
