When your local high school team wins a big game and you're a zealous supporter of the team, I'm thinking you exclaim, "We won!" Not, "They won!"

You say, "We won," even though you did not take part in the game. It was your team that won, so the joy of victory was yours, just as much as if you had been a part of the action on the field or court or rink or track.

If we can get excited over the exploits of a sports team, what excitement should fill our hearts as we consider the greatest contest of all time — and all eternity. It's not a game at all, but a life-anddeath struggle for the souls of the human race, one in which the eternal Son of God came to earth to take our place in the battle of life and death!

In our name, in our place, on our behalf, Christ Jesus went to battle and won an eternal victory for us. When He cried, "It is finished," we cried, "It is finished," because He was taking our place for the punishment of our sin. And even though we had no part in the action, we can look to Christ, whose grave was empty on Easter morning. And with complete and zealous joy, we can say "We won!"

What have we won? Martin Luther summarized the fruit of the victory in his explanation to the second article of the Apostles' Creed:

[Christ has] purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil.

Someone once said that Christianity is the religion of the personal pronoun. The heart and soul of the Christian message is salvation by substitution.

- "He was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities." ISAIAH 53:5
- "[Christ] was delivered for our offenses, and was raised again for our justification." ROMANS 4:25
- "Because I live, you shall live also." JOHN 14:19

It is true, we had no part in the action. We were nowhere around. But because God's Son, Jesus, came to earth for us, because He kept God's Law for us, because He suffered our punishment, endured our hell and died our death, we can look at His empty grave and we can stand with hope-filled hearts beside the graves of loved ones who died in the Lord. And we can know that their graves will one day be empty, too. Then we can joyfully shout, "We won!"

Our world through a Lutheran lens

f you are a member of a South Dakota District congregation, you recently received your last issue *The Lutheran Witness* that's covered by your congregation. That's because of a resolution recently passed by district voters to end a decades-old policy of congregations paying for a subscription for all of its members. The vote was prompted by subscription costs more than doubling in 2024. Your March issue was wrapped in cellophane, with a letter from me on a piece of paper, separate from the magazine.

My letter informed you how to continue receiving *The Lutheran Witness*. Here's the text of my message:

Greetings to you, in Jesus' name! I have some important news for you regarding your *Lutheran Witness* subscription. For years, your congregation has been providing a subscription for you, paid for by the congregation. But because of the recent vote of the congregations of the LCMS South Dakota District to discontinue that District-wide policy, this is the last issue of the periodical you'll receive under your current subscription.

But you will be able to subscribe on your own, or you may be able to receive *The Lutheran Witness* at your church.

Please check with your church leadership as to what their plans may be to encourage and arrange for you to receive this official periodical of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod.

I urge you to subscribe. If you do, you'll continue to receive the fine main section of *The Lutheran Witness*. And, for a few dollars more, you will receive the South Dakota District insert, bringing you news from our congregations, schools, the LWML, and our life ministries in the State.

If your church will not be offering *The Lutheran Witness* and you wish to start an individual subscription, please contact Concordia Publishing House at 800-325-3040 and select option #2 for Magazines. You can also email them at *magazines@cph. org.* Identify yourself as a member of the South Dakota District and you'll receive an extra discount.

It's important that you check with your pastor or another leader of your congregation to see whether there might be a plan to have a special sign-up for individual subscriptions. Or your church might be planning to get a number of copies of *The Lutheran Witness* each month for you to pick up at the church.

If you order your own subscription, as instructed above, make sure you say you're from South Dakota. Then you'll get the magazine for the discounted price of \$24.99, which includes the main magazine and the South Dakota District insert. That's a \$5 savings from the regular cost.



As a result of the vote to end the current policy of congregations paying for subscriptions to *The Lutheran Witness (LW)* for all their members, congregation members will no longer receive copies of *LW* or the South Dakota District insert courtesy of their congregations. What does this mean for you, *The Lutheran Witness* and the district insert? Here are some frequently asked questions and their answers about subscribing to the *LW* and receiving the district insert going forward:

Who contacts Concordia Publishing House (CPH), the publisher of *LW*, to cancel the current subscriptions for each congregation?

This has already been arranged through the South Dakota District office. The March 2024 issue of *LW* was the final issue you received under the policy.

Must all current subscriptions be canceled?

How may we continue to receive the *LW* after March 2024?

Individuals or households may subscribe on their own. Or congregations can have a sign-up time to collect information for individual subscriptions. Or congregations may have a bundle of the periodicals sent to the church for distribution to members. Stay tuned for news from your congregation and the district on how individuals may subscribe by way of their congregations, or how a congregation may receive bulk copies for distribution at the church.

How much is a *LW* subscription for South Dakota District members? CPH is offering district members a special rate of \$19.99 for a year's

Kindness in cans

The students of Bethesda Lutheran School, Hot Springs, got elbow deep in their most recent service project. Led by Staci Pokorski, who teaches second through fourth grade, the classes collected offerings during weekly chapel service to donate to the local food pantry.

The students raised \$300 in three months and purchased over 150 pounds of food for the pantry. The children compared prices and chose the most needed, shelf-stable foods. After grocery shopping, the students loaded the food in the church van and delivered it directly to the food pantry. Older students packed food bags while younger students weighed and sorted food to stock on the shelves.

The children learned the importance of serving our neighbor as well as the importance of food pricing and nutrition. This service project was also part of the National Lutheran Schools Week celebration.

subscription to the main part of the magazine. With the district insert, the cost will be \$24.99 for one year. This is for delivery to your home or post office box. If you wish to receive the *LW* in this way, please contact CPH at 800.325-3040 and select option #2 for Magazines. You can also send an email to *magazines@ cph.org.* Make sure you indicate that you are from South Dakota to get the \$19.99/\$24.99 rate (a \$5 discount).

Congregations may provide the *LW* at the church for their members, without names and addresses of the members specified on the magazines. If that is done, 0 to 25 copies will be at the annual subscription rate of \$19.99/24.99 per magazine; 25-plus copies will be at the bulk rate of \$15.99 for the main part of the magazine, or \$18.39 with the district insert included.

Here is new information for an adjusted bulk rate for 25 or more subscriptions gathered at your church (from CPH): If you have a sign-up at the church and you have a minimum of 25 subscriptions, the subscribers will be charged \$17.10 for the main magazine, or 19.90 with the district insert included. The magazine will be sent to their mailing address.

It appears that the district insert will continue to be a part of the *LW*. What if I don't want to subscribe to the main magazine but still receive the district insert? Is this possible?

We will continue to produce the district section, and this section will be made available to non-subscribers to the *LW*, on other platforms and in other ways.

The district section is the copyright property of the LCMS South Dakota District, which means the district office is able to distribute it as it wishes. The district supplement is already posted at *sddlcms.org* under "News and Events." We also plan to include it as a regular feature in our twice-monthly email newsletter, a much different publication than the *LW* insert we produce.
