The formation of this council was approved during the 2021 district convention. Their chief task is to identify needs and opportunities in our congregations and communities, and to help provide resources to address those needs and opportunities.

Think of this group as a think-tank for our district. They study and bounce ideas off one another. They invite experts to their meetings to help with ministry areas like missions and youth ministry. Flowing from this think-tank activity, the council works to sponsor events to provide resources and Bible-based inspiration. Sometimes they appoint a group to plan and implement an event.

An example of a mission and ministry sponsored event was last year's P.A.S.S. It On workshop, held in Black Hawk and Sioux Falls. It provided a "toolbox" of resources for outreach, youth ministry, education, elders and the business side of congregations.

This November, the P.A.S.S. It On events will take on a more apologetic/

current-event emphasis. Participants will learn about carrying their witness into our culture and responding to and caring for those affected by the LGBTQ+lifestyle. Rev. Dr. Gregory Seltz, executive director of the Lutheran Center for Religious Liberty in Washington, D.C., will be the keynote speaker. Like last year's workshop, this will be a two-site event: Saturday, Nov. 2, in Rapid City, and Sunday, Nov. 3, in Sioux Falls.

Another resource growing out of this work of the council are events for men. Last December, a men's retreat was held in Brookings, attracting nearly 100 participants. A second men's retreat will be held Aug. 15-18 at the Campfire Cabins in the Black Hills (see Page 8).

Youth flex their biblical knowledge

Ten teams from five congregations, along with a Pierre Circuit team, gathered on March 23 at Faith, Pierre, for the district Bible Bowl. In all, 31 youth (grades 6-12) participated. Topics covered Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, Philemon, Psalm 118, and the Creed from Luther's Small Catechism

Teams from Our Savior, Aberdeen; Concordia, Cresbard; Faith, Sioux Falls; and Mount Calvary, Brookings, competed in the A division. In the championship game, team "Someth'n Catchy," from Our Savior, Aberdeen, narrowly defeated the threetime defending champion "Comets" from Concordia, Cresbard. "Mahalalel 2.0" from Faith, Sioux Falls, placed third.

In the B division, teams from the Pierre Circuit; Our Savior, Aberdeen; and Faith, Pierre, competed. The Pierre Circuit team, "Few and Far Between," placed first, while the "fire breathing little tiny dino dudes" from Our Savior placed second. "Us" from Our Savior placed third.

There were two perfect scores in the 100-question, multiple-choice individual exam. Luke Rausch (Concordia, Cresbard) and Rhylan Tschappat (Our Savior, Aberdeen) each scored a remarkable 99.97 on the exam, and Rausch then won the tiebreaker to finish first. Anika Bjordahl (Faith, Sioux Falls), who scored 94, finished third.



SFLS powerlifters break state records

Elyse Prouty and Anesha Bright, freshmen at Sioux Falls Lutheran School (SFLS), broke records at the South Dakota High School State Powerlifting Meet, held March 16 at Lincoln High School in Sioux Falls.

Prouty's deadlift of 285 pounds was 20 pounds more than the previous record. Bright's squat of 190 pounds was also 20 pounds more than the previous record.

Prouty placed first and Bright placed second in their weight classes.

"Anesha and Elyse showed the effort and persistence that they have shown all season long, and it paid off when it mattered," said Coach Bryce Ludwig, who is in his first season coaching powerlifting at SFLS. "They showcased the strength of our school and proved witness to the gifts they are blessed with by the Lord."

Prouty lifted a total of 595 pounds (205 squat, 105 bench, and 285 deadlift).

Bright lifted a total of 465 pounds (190 squat, 80 bench, and 195 deadlift).

SFLS was on track to finish construction of a new campus fitness center this spring. Financial help was received from the Fit 4 Him Fitness Center Challenge, which invited individuals, couples, families and church groups to financially contribute to the completion of the fitness center and for state-of-the-art lifting and athletic-training equipment.

Editor's note: The following is an excerpt of Rev. Ryan Drevlow's interview with Jenn Eekhoff, WRAP director of South Dakota Kids Belong, a nonprofit organization that aims to create awareness of and better outcomes for children in foster care. This is the second of a two-part article.

Pastor Ryan: I visit a lot of folks. I see houses with extra bedrooms and I think what a difference they could make in our state or our country if they were willing to give of themselves, but I think a lot of people are scared of foster care.

Jenn: I think some of the media has played a role in our idea of what a foster parent is or what the foster kids are like. WRAP is a great on-ramp for people to meet foster families who are doing the hard work. And WRAP can help people see how they could do foster care, too.

Pastor Ryan: Was that intentional at WRAP to create places where people meet and see foster kids and families to encourage more people to become foster parents?

Jenn: I don't know if it was an (intentional) idea, but it was definitely a result. We have some stories about fam-

ilies in Spearfish, where one family in the church was fostering. The family had a team of four or five families around them. Now, three out of those five families are fostering themselves.

If foster families talk about our experiences — not just the hard stuff, but the good, rewarding things that happen with

this sort of ministry — we can spark interest in other people. We can also encourage them to take that step. WRAP is great because through it people are exposed to foster care. WRAP communities get to see the kids and families and all the potential in it.

Pastor Ryan: I know from personal experience that South Dakota *adoptuskids.org* will pull on your heartstrings in all of the right ways. What are the top three things that the average person sitting in the pew on Sunday morning could do to support foster care in South Dakota?

Jenn: The top thing to do is to pray. Pray about what God is calling you

to do. Pray for specific actions in your own life. The Holy Spirit will encourage you in the direction that God wants you to go. So pray for personal direction.

Second, pray for the families doing the hard work.

And third, get involved in some way. Get to know a foster family in

your community. Make yourself aware of what is going on in your community with foster care. Do something. Search out existing communities. In Sioux Falls, we have "The Foster Network." This would be a great place to get started. You can donate, serve or get involved by doing some type of more direct work with foster families. Find out what the local community needs because every community is different.

2023 was the biggest year yet for the LCMS Short-Term Mission Program, which sent more volunteers on mission trips and filled more field requests than ever before. LCMS short-term mission teams are usually made up of three to 15 people who serve alongside LCMS missionaries and Lutheran partners to proclaim Christ in a specific location for one to two weeks. Short-term mission trips take place all over the world, in all four LCMS mission regions: Latin America, Africa, Eurasia and Asia.

Some short-term mission trips are intended for congregations; others are intended to be educational or are geared especially to church workers or people interested in long-term mission work. Teams may be formed by congregations, families, friends or other groups.

Some of the ways that short-term mission teams have served have been providing English Bible Camps, property

construction or renovation, vacation Bible school or mission education. All of the short-term opportunities are designed to help support the strategic goals of the Synod's mission work in that field and region: to spread the Gospel, plant Lutheran churches and show mercy.

Short-term mission teams are generally responsible for all travel and coordination costs. In some cases, teams may be responsible for any project costs. The placement process involves an online application, placement consultation and pastoral recommendation.

Short-term mission trips offered by the program in 2024 are close to filling up, but there are still openings for teams to serve this fall. And it is not too early to start thinking about 2025.
