God's Gospel: Salvation Power

The apostle Paul, in Romans 1:16, makes the fearlessly daring claim that the Gospel, the Good News about Jesus Christ, is the “power of God unto salvation.”

Imagine! Words about the Word made flesh, Jesus, are able to drive the rich and famous to their knees in humble faith. They are able to raise up the lowly so that they stand with heads held high, with a new identity as children of God through faith in Christ Jesus.

Of course, the ability to believe is not something that comes from within our sinful selves. We did not decide to believe. It's God's power. Luther, in the Explanation to the Third Article of the Creed, wrote:

I cannot, by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith.

St. Paul, similarly, emphasizes that faith is “the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast” (EPHESIANS 2:8C-9).

I chose Romans 1:16-17 as the theme verses of the next district convention, which is scheduled for Feb. 16-18, 2025, at the Sioux Falls Convention Center. I chose those verses and the “God’s Gospel: Salvation Power” theme because the 105 congregations of the LCMS South Dakota District exist solely because of the power of the Gospel. You belong to one of these 105 congregations by Spirit-given faith, planted and nurtured by the Gospel.

And it’s the power of the Good News of God’s love for you in Christ Jesus that spurs you and your congregation to do deeds of love and speak words of witness. This is another reason I chose Romans 1:16-17 and the “God’s Gospel: Salvation Power” theme as the focus of our convention and of our work together in the next triennium (2025-2028).

I do want to remind our district’s pastors and the leaders of our congregations that they have one assignment that’s due before the convention: to choose the voting pastoral delegate and the voting lay delegate and alternate lay delegate to represent your parish. This is done by way of a voters meeting. You also have the privilege of nominating one pastor to serve as president of the district and one pastor to serve as a vice-president.

An optional “assignment” is for your congregation to submit an overture — a proposed item of business — for the delegates to consider at the convention.

A convention mailing to all congregations, with much more informa-

Campus visit becomes multi-generational trip

In early June, a group of youth and adults from several South Dakota District congregations headed east to give youth a tour of Concordia University Wisconsin, Mequon, Wis., Concordia Seminary, St. Louis (CSL), and Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne (CTSFW). Following the campus visits, the group traveled to the Creation Museum and Ark Encounter in Kentucky.

According to Jessie Kuechenmeister, administrative assistant at Mount Calvary, Brookings, the trip was initially planned specifically as a youth trip, but organizers opted to open up the trip to adults as well. “In hindsight, although it required more planning, it was so

neat to have youth and adults together, and the trip worked out wonderfully,” Kuechenmeister said.

In all, 37 travelers — 19 youth and 18 adults — from Brookings, Freeman, Sioux Falls and Wentworth made the trip.

Rev. Matthew Wurm, senior pastor of Mount Calvary, provided daily morning and evening devotions in a variety of settings, including the shores of Lake Michigan; the small chapel at CTSFW; the cafeteria and patio at Potter’s Ranch (a private retreat in Union, Ky.); and on the charter bus. The group also attended chapel services at both seminaries.

In addition to the campus tours, admissions representatives met with the group

to share information and answer questions. The group stayed overnight in the dorms at each campus.

While in Kentucky, the group stayed at Potter’s Ranch for two nights. In addition to enjoying meals and fellowship, participants were able to go ziplining, kayaking and hiking, and play a variety of games.

“Potter’s Ranch was perfect, as it allowed for activities and fellowship with each other,” Kuechenmeister said. “In fact, almost all trip attendees said they wished we had more time at Potter’s Ranch.”

Mount Calvary, Brookings, hopes to offer this faith-strengthening, educational and joyous adventure to youth and adults every three years.

Who am I?

But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. **1 Peter 2:9**

I suppose I should begin by introducing myself. I am Rev. Christopher McCarthy, pastor of First, Wall, and Emmanuel, Creighton, since 2017, having been called as a candidate from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, upon graduation. My wife, Carrie, and I were married in September 2021, and we are blessed with one son, Micah. Carrie is a Lutheran teacher from Baltimore.

At the 2024 district convention, you elected me to be your junior pastoral counselor. I am excited and honored to serve you in this role.

It is an exciting time of year, isn't it? Carrie, Micah and I have been working hard on our garden all year and are looking forward to the harvest from our labors. After harvesting comes canning, storing and jelly-making.

I am sure this is an exciting time of year for you, too! You are looking forward to your own harvest. Perhaps

you are anticipating a new school year or upcoming holidays. You will encounter new initiatives at work, another year on the church calendar, another winter.

I don't know how it is for you, but the end of the summer season always leaves me with a sense of ... *regret* is not the right word ... but *unfulfillment*, perhaps. Can you relate? We are limited by the seasons. By work. By school. By routine. The same old, same old sets in and we start to wonder, "What is all this for?" "What am I doing with my life?" "How will I be remembered by my community, or will I be remembered at all?"

I think about these questions often. They all center around this question: "Who am I?"

And that is where the Holy Spirit comforts us. First Peter answers the question for us: "You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for His own possession..." (2:9). Suddenly, those questions melt away, not because the routine is different, not because the seasons are different or your schedule is different, but because *you* are different. For He has called you by the Gospel, the Good News that Jesus has purchased and won you by His blood. Your sin — what you did that you shouldn't have, or what you didn't do that you should have — is covered by His blood. Death is not the end for you, just as it was not the end of Him. Instead, He is the end of death.

Satan cannot claim you. Why? Because you — you! — have been called out of his darkness and into Christ's marvelous light.

Yes, even as the days get shorter. Even as routine sets in. Even as the seasons change. Yes, even in these things, proclaim His excellencies, for you are a people for His own possession, bought by the blood of Jesus.

YANKTON ZONE UPDATE

The Yankton Zone held its Spring Christian Life Workshop April 20 at Immanuel Lutheran Fellowship Hall in Menno. Thirty-seven people attended the event, co-hosted by LWML groups from Immanuel, Menno; and St. Paul, Scotland.

Rev. Brian Mosemann, senior pastoral counselor, presented on "How to Handle

a Sword," based on 2 Timothy 2:15, and explained how Law and Gospel are hard to define separately and may sometimes overlap.

Pray for the Alpha Center



Editor's note: Rev. Ryan Drevlow recently sat down with Erica Miller and Jenna Spellerberg of the **Alpha Center** in Sioux Falls to learn more about its work and mission. The following is the second of a two-part excerpt from that interview. Erica serves as Alpha Center executive director and Jenna is nurse manager.

Rev. Drevlow: How can Lutherans in South Dakota support the Alpha Center?

Erica Miller: The Alpha Center is a non-profit organization. We are completely supporter funded. We don't have any government grants. We are only able to offer our services to clients because of generous supporters giving us their time, talents and treasures. We don't rely strictly on finances — supporters choosing to pray for us is also a tremendous help. Donate time. Donate baby items. There are a variety of ways that people can get involved at the Alpha Center.

Jenna Spellerberg: Yes! Please pray for us! Anybody. Anywhere. Please pray. We see God work here at the Alpha Center every single day. He is changing hearts and lives. No matter the outcome of a pregnancy, no matter what happens in our life, God can use it for good. We see this at the Alpha Center.

We need prayer warriors for our staff, our volunteers, and the women and men that we get to see every day. The best part of my job is getting to meet with the women who we serve. They are incredible. They have hard stories. But they are some of the most amazing people that I've ever met. It's such a gift to know them.

One thing that I would like to be on the forefront of people's minds as they pray is that we have a mobile medical unit now called Legacy. Our goal with our mobile medical unit is to reach even more with our services: pregnancy tests, ultrasounds, STD testing, options and counseling. This unit is on the road so that we can go to women in need. We also go to college campuses and rural areas.

Miller: The Alpha Center provides care after birth, as well. In fact, our educational programs serve a timeframe from when a mom finds out she's pregnant up until her baby is two. This means that, through a woman's entire pregnancy and the baby's first two years of life, we can meet with the mother on a weekly basis for education programs and offer support.

We also want to offer community referrals for things that we don't provide and for ongoing care beyond that two-year mark. The Alpha Center provides ongoing support when the rubber meets the road.

Drevlow: Two ladies from my previous congregation in Sioux Falls were mentor mothers in those classes. The parents take tests and work through the classes. As they do, they earn points toward diapers, baby supplies and more. I imagine there must be a lot of joy in giving supplies to mothers.

Miller: There absolutely is. And like you said, they do earn those points when they come in for the education lessons. They're not only learning important parenting skills, but they're also earning points they can redeem for items for their baby. They're getting items at no cost, but there's some investment on their part.

We have all of those items that are donated from churches, individuals and organizations that parents can shop for with their points in our baby boutique and take home. We're able to do that because of generous supporters who are willing to supply those items.

Drevlow: Fantastic. I am honored by you and the work that you do. God bless you.

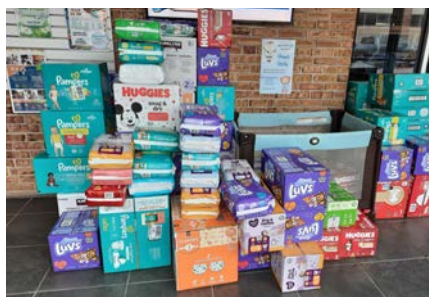
Competition benefits expectant parents
