Palm Sunday dedication

Growing in grace

But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To him be the glory both now and to the day of eternity. Amen. 2 Peter 2:18

hat joy in the summer months as everything is green and growing, and what joy in our hearts as we grow in God's grace.

As we reflect on 2 Peter 3:18, the theme verse of the national LWML Convention in Omaha June 26–

29, we find a call that resonates deeply with the vibrant themes of Pentecost — the outpouring of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the church. Peter, inspired by that same Spirit who descended like tongues of fire, urges us to "grow in the grace and knowledge" of Jesus Christ. This isn't a passive suggestion, but an active invitation to live in the transformative power of God's love, a power made manifest at Pentecost.

Pentecost is the celebration of the Spirit's arrival — wind and flame igniting a fledgling group of believers into a bold community of faith. That same Spirit works in us today, nurturing our growth in grace. Grace is God's unmerited favor, freely given through Christ's death and resurrection. To grow in it means that the Lord's gifts have their way with us, shaping our hearts and lives. It's the Spirit who softens our stubbornness, opens our eyes to God's mercy and through us proclaims that grace to others. Just as the disciples spoke in new languages to reach the nations, we proclaim Christ's love in ways that transcend barriers.

Knowledge, too, is a Pentecostal theme. The Spirit doesn't leave us in ignorance, but reveals the truth of Christ — His lordship, His sacrifice, His victory. At Pentecost, Peter preached with clarity and conviction, drawing thousands to faith. Growing in knowledge isn't about amassing facts; it's about knowing Jesus and what He has done for us ever more



deeply, and trusting Him ever more for all things in our lives. The Spirit guides us into this intimacy through Scripture, the Sacraments, prayer and the fellowship of believers, whether in church or at the convention in Omaha.

Lutherans hold dear the truth that we're saved by grace through faith, not by our own efforts. Yet Peter's words remind us that this grace is dynamic; it calls us forward. Like the church born at Pentecost, we're not meant to stagnate, but to flourish, giving glory to Christ "now and to the day of eternity." As the Spirit filled the upper room, He fills us still, fueling our growth until Christ returns.

Marching for life in the nation's capital

Greetings, South Dakota District. Thanks to you and Lutherans For Life for sending me to the March for Life in Washington, D.C., in January. It has been a dream of mine to attend for the last 15 years of my ministry. I wanted to make my voice heard in D.C. on this most important issue.

The evening before the rally, our LCMS community gathered to hear important news regarding the fight against abortion. The past few years have brought legal victories but, in some areas, abortions have increased. We listened to presentations from Rev. Dr. Matthew Harrison, LCMS president; Rev. Dr. Gregory Seltz, executive director of the Lutheran Center for Religious Liberty; and Tim Goeglein, vice-president of External and Government Relations for Focus on the Family.

On the day of the march, I woke up early with excitement. My wife, Laura, and I boarded a bus to Immanuel, Alexandria, Va., where we attended a wonderful worship service. Then we boarded the bus to the Washington Monument, where the rally was being held. Many great speakers and musicians were there, as were pastors and priests. A young man had been a victim of an attempted abortion, yet survived and had a wonderful message to tell. Sen. John Thune gave a fine speech in support of life. President Donald Trump recorded a speech, announcing he had just pardoned Eva Edl and 22 other abortion protestors who were tried and convicted by the previous administration, and the whole crowd roared with cheers. Vice-President J.D. Vance delivered an in-person speech in support of life.

The March for Life was magical. We sang hymns. We spoke the Creed, the Lord's Prayer and Psalm 23. We recited sections from the Catechism by memory. I especially loved singing "I am Jesus Little Lamb." Young people all around us made up cheers for life. There were drums, big banners and bullhorns. There was a moment when I could see the U.S. Capitol building along the route and I knew that both legislative houses were in session, and that they could hear us as we sang and cheered for the end of abortion.

The march ended at the U.S. Supreme Court. LCMS attendees gathered for a prayer and short devotion. I sat and considered for a moment how wonderful it is that we can march for life and redress the wrong of abortion in our country. Thanks be to God.

There was a banquet later and the speakers were great, especially Bethany Dirks (formerly Bethany Hamilton, known as the Soul Surfer girl). She spoke about her life and her beliefs about life. A fun little thing was that we found out she had recently converted to the LCMS. She learned our doctrine from Rev. Bryan Wolfmueller, pastor of St. Paul, Austin, Texas, and host of a YouTube channel devoted to Lutheran theology. We were proud of our beloved Synod.

1 WAYS TO WELCOME A CHURCH WORKER

Welcoming a new church worker is a transition for all involved, from the church worker to the church leaders to the members of the congregation. In May, we shared a true story that illustrates why communication is vital to welcoming a new church worker into your congregation. In part 2 on welcoming new church workers, we share 10 ways to welcome a church worker into your congregation and community.

• Understand that clear communication between the pastor/church worker and congregation is critical.

Clear, continual conversations between a pastor and church leadership is essential. Church leadership needs to keep members informed on what is happening concerning the church worker's arrival, installation service and other related items.

2 Recognize that you're worker is "new" in many aspects

Don't assume the pastor or church worker automatically knows everything about the church's traditions, history and customs that have been going on for decades.

3 If the church has a parsonage/ teacherage, make sure the place is ready for them on day one.

This includes making sure appliances, furnaces and air conditioners are working or replaced, if necessary. Have the house completely cleaned and painted before the church worker arrives. (The worker can change colors later if they want.)

Create a church worker support team

This group should include at least one or two elders, and two other members who are concerned about the overall welfare of the pastor/church worker and their family. A good description of this group can be found in the book *Holding Up the Prophet's Hand:*

6 Welcome the new church worker with gift cards to local restaurants and grocery stores.

Instead of a food shower, have members give gift cards or cash gifts that allow the church worker to try some of the local restaurants and stores.

6 Have someone in the congregation give the pastor/church worker a tour of the community.

This tour can include the church worker's family and end with a meal at a local hang out, or maybe a picnic at the local park.

In the first few months of the pastor/ church worker's arrival, take time to stop by the office for a short visit in order to introduce yourself.

Consider inviting the pastor/church worker to your own home for a visit, or take them out for coffee or lunch. One might even consider inviting the church worker and his or her family over for a nice dinner or backyard barbecue.

3 Respect boundaries established by the pastor/church worker and their families.

Supper time, evening hours and days off are to be respected and protected by the congregation. (Only in case of an immediate emergency should one contact the church worker.) Allowing

the pastor/church worker time with family will benefit the worker and the congregation.

If the parsonage belongs to the congregation, that does not entitle members, including church leaders, to stop by and invade the home. Proper respect includes setting up a time with the family for a visit or if repairs are needed.

9 Talk to them, not about them.

When the church worker/pastor does or says something that seems odd, before one speaks poorly about them (like the lady condemning the pastor over his use of sawhorses) take time to visit with them about the issue and share your concerns. In his explanation of the Eighth Commandment, Luther writes:

We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way.

When something good is happening in the church, share your joy with the church worker/pastor. If the church worker or their family experiences a blessing (like their oldest child scoring the winning touchdown), take the time to congratulate them. If you like the sermon, tell the pastor. Church workers need words of encouragement just like everyone else.

Participate and pray!

Participating in worship services, Bible studies and church activities is a great way of showing support to the workers God has called to serve the congregation. It is also a great way to grow in our relationship with our Lord and with fellow members. Praying for those God has called to share the Good News of salvation in Jesus Christ is one of the joyful services all members can do.
