HOLD YOUR CAMELS, KINGS!

Dear Saints,

I saw a meme close to Thanksgiving that had the Thanksgiving turkey shaking his fist of feathers at Santa Clause saying, "Wait your turn, fat boy!" The meaning was clear: Let's celebrate Thanksgiving before we rush into the Christmas season.

We have moved from Advent to the Nativity of our Lord, and now we are into the Church season of Christmas, looking forward to Epiphany. We need a meme that has Joseph with his hand up in a stop motion saying to the Magi, "Hold your camels, Kings!"

Almost every Christmas nativity scene and Christmas pageant has the angels, and the shepherds and the Magi gathered around Mary and Joseph and Jesus. St. Matthew tell us, "Behold, wise men from the east came to Jerusalem, saying, 'Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we saw His star when it rose and have come to worship Him'" Matthew 2:1b-2. Yes, the Magi did follow the Star that came to rest over the place where the child was, and by the time they got to Jesus He and Mary and Joseph were in a house.

My point is not to just be historically accurate with the events of Christ's birth but to take the time to see each event and celebrate the wonderful gift and promise they bring. The Magi are an important part of all our salvation story. We wait for that story - not for the Christmas season but for Epiphany.

The Nativity of Jesus is unprecedented in human history. Babies are born all the time, but this birth is Almighty God incarnating Himself. The eternal, almighty second member of the Holy Trinity took on human flesh and blood, was born of virgin Mary and came to live in our world. That event alone demands our attention. God (Jesus) is born into our world because God (the Father) made a promise when our first parents, Adam and Eve, brought sin into our world and lives. Read Genesis chapters 1-3.

But wait, there is more! Jesus was born for you. When you gathered with your family and friends at Church on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day, you heard about one of



the first physical signs of the length God will go to, to forgive you and give you eternal salvation. St. John says it this way: "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth. For from his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. For the law was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. John 1:14, 16-18.

Jesus being born into our world and in our lives through faith is God's grace. A gift we do not deserve, but a gift of love. Jesus' birth points us to the truth of what He came to do. "For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost". Luke 19:10. Jesus was born to save us. And He did. Nailed to a cross, the perfect sinless sacrifice was offered for the imperfect sinner, you. The last part of the last verse of the hymn, "O Little Town of Bethlehem," becomes our Christmas prayer, "O come to us, abide with us, Our Lord Immanuel!"

James holds a Bachelor of Science in Education, a Master of Science in Sport Pedagogy and a Master of Education in School Administration from South Dakota State University. He is licensed as an administrator in both South Dakota and Minnesota.

Since joining SFLS in 2021, he has provided steady, visionary leadership during a season of significant growth. BETHESDA LUTHERAN

Bethesda Lutheran School Welcomes South Dakota Service Dogs for Hands-On Learning Experience

Students at Bethesda Lutheran School received a special visit on November 13, 2025 from South Dakota Service Dogs, an organization dedicated to training dogs that assist veterans and first responders by providing them with specially trained service dogs at no cost. The visit was part of an ongoing effort by the school to connect classroom learning with real-world service and compassion.

Handlers from the organization brought service dog, Honey, to the school, demonstrating how the animals learn essential skills—from retrieving dropped items to providing physical support and interrupting anxiety episodes. Students watched as the dogs followed complex commands with calm focus, learning how long and intensive the training process can be. The school's interest in service dogs grew earlier this year when students chose South Dakota Service Dogs as the recipient of their weekly chapel offering. Moved by what they learned about the organization's mission, they decided their donations could make a meaningful difference.

Principal Hunsaker said she couldn't be prouder of her students' choice.

"Our kids showed such genuine compassion when they selected South



Dakota Service Dogs for their chapel money," Hunsaker said. They saw a need, wanted to support it, and were able to see exactly how their generosity helps. I'm incredibly proud of their hearts and their willingness to give."

Teachers say the visit helped students better understand not only how service dogs change lives, but also the patience and dedication required to train them. Many students had the chance to ask questions, meet Honey up close, and learn about different types of disabilities these animals support.

As Honey trotted out of the building—tail wagging and students cheering—staff members remarked that the experience was one the children are unlikely to forget. With plans already underway for future service-learning opportunities, Bethesda Lutheran School hopes to continue fostering a spirit of empathy, curiosity, and community engagement. Counselor's Corner

Your Light Has Come

"Trust the science!" We hear it constantly. Yet science, for all its brilliance, is not infallible. What was once proclaimed as truth crumbles under new evidence. Science is a tool, not a savior. The wise men observed a star, interpreted its meaning, and followed the science. It led them to Jerusalem, to Herod's palace. Close, but wrong. They missed Bethlehem by about six miles and the true King by an eternity. Science got them near; only God's Word got them there.

Science is God's gift. It heals diseases, powers cities, feeds billions. But when we idolize it—trusting it for ultimate meaning, life, or salvation—it becomes a false god. The Magi needed more than stars. After Herod, the priests quoted Micah 5:2: "Bethlehem... from you shall come a ruler." Scripture redirected them. The star reappeared, but now guided by the Word of God, it led to Jesus.

Knowledge alone fails us. From Eden, the serpent promised godlike wisdom through forbidden fruit. Adam and Eve chased knowledge apart from God and reaped death. Darkness spread, as Isaiah foretold: "thick darkness [shall cover] the peoples" (Isaiah 60:2). Sin divides, devalues life, and death steals it. Science prolongs life but cannot defeat sin or the grave. Sometimes it accelerates destruction—weapons, addictions, ethical compromises.

Yet light breaks through: "Arise, shine, for your light has come!" (Isaiah 60:1). God's Word became flesh. Jesus, the Light, entered our darkness. Born in Bethlehem, baptized with sinners, eating with outcasts, He bore our sins on the cross. Darkness peaked at Calvary, but on the third day, He rose, shattering death's power. Forgiveness, resurrection, eternal life—these are His gifts.

Herod and the priests knew the Scriptures but rejected the Word made flesh. Fear drove Herod to massacre innocents; fear led priests to demand crucifixion. We too fear what following Jesus might cost: reputation, comfort, relationships. The Magi show another way. Guided by Scripture, they found the Child, fell down, worshiped, and offered treasures. Their joy was exceeding. Science points to order, but Scripture points to the Creator.

Wise men still follow His Word. The gifts differ—time, service, love—but the Gift is the same: Jesus, who baptizes, forgives, feeds us with His body and blood. Walk in His light. In Him, we depart this life not in fear but in peace, shining with His light. The Lord make His face shine upon you.

THE STAGGERING STATISTICS OF DOWN SYNDROME BABIES

In 2020, Sarah and Grant DeJong felt called to adopt a baby with Down Syndrome. Already parents to five children at the time — including their oldest, Cheyenne, who was born with Down Syndrome — they wanted to open their hearts and loving home to another child with an extra chromosome. That heartfelt decision became the seed that God used to grow the Down Syndrome Adoption Program at Lutheran Family Service.

75% of babies in the United States diagnosed in the womb with Down Syndrome are aborted.

Through prayer and perseverance, Baby Grace joined the DeJong family in December 2021. Today, Grace is a joyful toddler, loved deeply by her parents and siblings, and a living witness to the blessing and value of every child.

The presence of Down Syndrome is usually discovered before birth, with the sad result of this test most often being a death sentence: 75% of babies in the United States diagnosed in the womb with Down Syndrome are aborted. Since doctors often don't know of the many families eager to adopt a baby with Down Syndrome, they never present adoption as a life-giving option. In recent years, LFS has invited your partnership to educate obstetrics professionals in Nebraska, Iowa, and Illinois about adoption as a hopeful, available choice. That effort expands to South Dakota this year. With your support —and without charging fees — LFS helps two families each year adopt a child with Down Syndrome. It's making a difference: so far, three babies are now thriving in safe, loving Christian homes.

Through programs offering traditional, Down Syndrome, and embryo adoption in four states (with more on the horizon), Lutheran Family Service continues to build on our nearly 125-year history of wrapping the Church and Christian families around babies who need them. Each child is placed with a father and mother who are married, love God, and are active in their Christian faith. Each baby will also be brought into God's family through the waters of Holy Baptism. Our ability to place children with married male/female Christian parents is only possible because of partnerships with people like you whose annual and legacy gifts sustain this ministry without the use of government funds, which would otherwise direct policy and practice.




